

Pilot Harold Dahl To Tell Of Experiences As Fighter

Loyalist Flier Will Be Heard On "We, The People" Tuesday; Heidt Show Set In Chicago

Harold E. Dahl, American who flew in Spain for the Loyalists, and who has just been pardoned by General Franco, will head the list of guests on Gabriel Heatter's "We, the People" program Tuesday at 9 p. m. over WABC.

Dahl was released from prison largely thru the efforts of his wife, Edith, who wrote to General Franco sending him a picture of herself. Mrs. Dahl appeared on the program herself several months ago to tell the story of her efforts to free her husband.

"Remember the Alamo," famous rallying cry used by General Sam Houston to bring his retreating forces into a solid mass of fighting men to conquer the guerrilla's of Santa Anna and win independence for Texas, is the keynote of the Rush Hughes "Hughesreed" describing the "Birth of the Lone Star State." SEWAGE SURVEY ACTION DELAYED

Ottawa Councilmen Favor Further Inspection Of Existing Systems

(Lima News Bureau) OTTAWA, March 19 - Decision on what firm is to be awarded a contract to survey the sewage disposal needs of Ottawa will be made at the regular meeting of the village council on Monday, April 1.

This was determined last night when the council met in a special session in the municipal building here. The body had expected to let a contract last night but some of the members requested that additional systems be viewed before the action is taken to determine the efficiency of some of the firms that have bid on the survey work.

Groups of the council decided last night to visit North Baltimore, Carey, Van Wert, Wapakoneta and Coldwater during the next 10 days. The councilmen already have viewed sewer and sewage disposal systems in five other communities.

Eight bids have been received on the work which the council wishes done to learn how extensive an improvement is needed to meet state health requirements here. The state department of health has warned the village officials that they must clean up the unsanitary conditions that exist due to the outdated sewage disposal system here.

Motorists still are driving over the abandoned street in the east end of Ottawa which was a part of the old Findlay-Ottawa highway, council was informed. The body suggested to street employees that a railing be erected to stop the trespassing, as residents have informed officials they wish to landscape the spot.
