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Mayor Bernien Steps Out of Office

Reedsburg Sees Light Vote With Little Contest April 2

REEDSBURG - With only one contest for a seat on the common council, voters here face one of the quietest elections in years.

Besides the aldermanic position, three candidates are after the assessor's post, and four persons are running for three seats on the school board.

Alderman R. H. Miller, first ward, is unopposed for mayor. Mayor Alfred W. Bernien, who has served the city since 1921, refused to be a candidate for reelection.

Others on the city ballot, all incumbents, and unopposed are: William H. Dierken, city clerk; Louisa Haessler, city treasurer; Emil H. Miller, supervisor; first ward, and Vic H. Kansier, justice of the peace.

On the school board ballot, three places, each for three years, are to be filled by the city at large. P. R. Schwake, William Arvid, L. C. Fuchs, all incumbents, and T. J. Merkel, are candidates.

Voters also will mark a city referendum ballot this year on whether or not the city should be empowered to make an annual appropriation for commercial and industrial development.

Ft. Atkinson FT. ATKINSON - Of the four men who filed nomination papers for two vacant seats in the city council here, Otto Trieloff is the lone candidate seeking reelection.

The other candidates are: Tony Statz, Robert Krueger, and John Urban. Statz was a popular write-in candidate two years ago, losing to J. V. Romoser by a close vote.

Al Dollase had nomination papers for councilman circulated in his behalf but did not file them. All the present supervisors are seeking reelection without opposition.

Cuba City CUBA CITY - Five contests will be decided in the coming spring election here.

Charles W. Gibson, incumbent, will be opposed by George Loefelholz, alderman from the second ward, for mayor; Wilbur Hird, treasurer, will be opposed by Robert Nelson and La Verne Webster, third ward supervisor, who will be seeking reelection with Byron Goldthorpe as his opponent.

The perennial Alvin Schmieder-John E. Cook battle for constable of the third ward provides the fifth contest. Other candidates are: city clerk, Francis Phillips; assessor, Nick Wagner; aldermen, second ward, Carl Wilberding; third ward, John Lacke; fourth ward, Orris Lyster.

Supervisor, first ward, A. D. Gibson; second ward, Norman Ebert; fourth ward, Byron H. Willey.

Constable, first ward, Walter Byrne; second ward, Myrtle Byrne; fourth ward, Fred Lyster.

Walsh, head of veterinary obstetrics at Iowa State college; Dr. M. H. Fohrman, bureau of dairy industry, Washington, D. C., and Howard Clapp, herdsman of the Paist farms near Oconomowoc.

State College Body Elects Nevin James

Nevin James, Oshkosh, Wednesday was chosen 12th president of the Association of Wisconsin State Teachers Colleges at the 12th biennial convention of the association held in the state capitol.

Other officers elected were Erle J. Stoneman, Stevens Point, vice-president, and Carrie B. Edmondson, Milwaukee, secretary-treasurer. Justin Williams, River Falls, and Myrtle Trovbridge, Milwaukee, were elected to the executive committee.

A dead-lock in which Hilda Belle Oxy, Eau Claire, secretary for the past two years, and Miss Edmondson tied at 11-11 in three ballots cast highlighted the meeting. Miss Edmondson won out when a third candidate entered the voting.

In revising the constitution the delegates decided to drop the finance committee and give its duties to the executive committee, and to provide for an additional committee on improvement of teacher education.

Speaking at the annual association banquet Wednesday night in Hotel Lorraine, Dr. Syud Hossain, lecturer in the history of civilization at the University of Southern California, described India's policy of liberation under Mohandas K. Gandhi as "conquest made by self-suffering and sacrifice."

"The British are hanging on to India for dear life," he asserted, pointing out India is the largest consumer of British exports and its loss would mean economic ruin for England.

"When we tolerate British imperialism on we condemn Japan, Hitler, or Stalin," he queried.

Dr. Hossain, who recently returned from a "political circumnavigation of the world," warned that any plans for world peace, reconstruction, and recovery must take India into consideration.

Iowa County Teachers' Group Meets March 30

DODGEVILLE - The Iowa County Teachers' group will hold its annual meeting in the Dodgeville high school, Saturday, March 30.

The morning program will consist of class observation in the Dodgeville grades for rural and grade teachers; round table discussion on guidance programs for high school teachers and principals; an address by Maybelle Bush of the state department of public instruction, and a business meeting.

A noon luncheon will be served in the Masonic temple. The program at the temple will consist of a short luncheon address by Miss Bush; a report by S. C. Anderson, and an address by C. H. Waller, lecturer in the University of Wisconsin department of education. Musical numbers will be furnished by the girls' double sextet and George Bennett of the Dodgeville school.

The present association officers are: president, M. A. Fisher; vice-president, Stanmore C. Anderson, and secretary-treasurer, Mary Benson.

Smalley to Have Three Jury Cases in Dodgeville

DODGEVILLE - Three jury cases and three issues of fact for jury will be heard by Judge Sherman L. Smalley, Lancaster, when circuit court convenes here next Monday.

Jury cases involve Mary A. Hogan, Waunakee, vs. Frank Jeuck, Mineral Point, in a damage suit resulting from an automobile accident in Rockford, Ill., more than a year ago; the East Side Lumber co., Watertown, vs. William McBoyle, Spring Green airport manager, in a money demand, and Charles Scullion, Dodgeville, vs. Walter Thomas, et al., town of Bougham, in another automobile accident damage suit.

In the Scullion case, Atty. Darrell MacIntyre, Madison, will appear for the plaintiff.

It is probable the \$65,000 accident suit filed last month by Mrs. Ole C. Jensen, Vernon county, wife of a farmer killed in an accident near Arena, and passengers of the truck, will be heard. The case has been agreed upon by lawyers involved but is not officially included on the calendar.
