# Good Listening:

## ... Radio, Instrument of Education

(Prepared by the Radio Committee, American Association of University Women)

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We feel that university and college stations in proportion to the time that they are on the air, because they are interested in education and not forced to cater to a buying public or to advertise a sponsored product, give the greatest amount of service and cover many interesting features. Many times members of the faculty are speakers on these programs. Some of these schools conduct quite ambitious programs under the name "College of the Air," running concurrently with the first and second semesters of the college year. The advantage of this is that one can plan his own schedule.

In our local area, Wisconsin, Iowa, and Illinois offer such well planned, well rounded programs—music, science in a mild form, literature—but in most attractive packages. WOI (640), Iowa State college, prides itself on its attack on what they called a deficiency of literature. The outgrowth of their course over the air was a Radio Book club, membership in which gave one access to old and new favorites for a small fee.

WILL (580), Illinois University station, supplements class room "Stradella" overture, von Flotow; "Clair de Lune," Debussy; "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot."
