

Popular Movie Players Will Be On Radio Theatre Show

Barbara Stanwyck And Fred McMurray To Portray Same Roles As In Screen Version; Other Monday Hits Set

Barbara Stanwyck plays the jewel thief and Fred McMurray the prosecuting attorney when "Remember the Night" is dramatized by the Radio theatre on Monday at 9 p. m. over WABC. Cecil B. DeMille will direct the famous pair in the same roles they had in the successful movie version now being shown thru the country.

DeMille's dramatization is based on the story of Lee Leander (Barbara Stanwyck) who is caught stealing a diamond necklace. John Sargeant (MacMurray) assistant in the office of the district attorney is assigned to the case just as he is about to leave town for the Christmas holidays.

He has the case postponed until New Year's but by mistake Lee's bail bond broker brings her to John's apartment and is forced to take her home to Indiana with him. Her trial brings the play to a dramatic climax.

Freddy Rich's band will open the Tommy Riggs-Betty Lou program Monday at 8 p. m. over WEAF with "Till We Meet Again." Betty Lou will sing "Jeepers Creepers," and Doris Rhodes, guest songstress of the evening, will give out with "Leavin' On The Old Top Rail." Tommy Riggs will conclude with his own rendition of "I May Be Wrong."

A salute to spring with some of the gayest tune-favorites of that season by the entire "Tune-Up Time" company will be featured on the broadcast at 8 p. m. Monday over WABC.

Opening with a choral number entitled, "Spring Is Here," the spring medley will include re-licking 1885 Gilbert and Sullivan ballad, "The Flowers That Bloom, Etc.," and "Lilacs in the Rain." Andre and his 45 musicians will play "April Showers."

For additional orchestral highlights, "Tune-Up Time's" maestro has chosen Rene de Rosa's "Starlit Hours" and "Out Your Old Rag Bonnet" done in humorous Kostelnycz fashion, and an unusual Rumanian air for the violins, called "Hora Staccato."

"My Temptation," "Leavin' On The Old Top Rail" and "You're In My Heart Alone" will be Martin's solo contributions.

After a concert tour thru the middle west, Margaret Spinko, distinguished American soprano, will return to the Voice of Firestone as soloist on Monday at 8:30 p. m. over WEAF.

For her appearance Miss Spinko has chosen the aria, Mon Coeur S'ouvre a la Voix, from Saint-Saens' "Samson and Delilah," and "We Will Always Be Sweetheart." "The Old Refrain" by Kreisler, and "Noth the Southern Moon" from Victor Herbert's "Naughty Marietta."

The orchestra under direction of Alfred Wallenstein, will be heard in the overture to "Carmen" by Bizet, Dvorak's "Humoresque" and Strauss' "Thousand and One Nights Waltz."

Maire Green and her Merry Men, famous radio singing group, will be Alec Templeton's guests, Monday, when they are heard on "Alec Templeton Time" over WEAF at 9:30 p. m. Templeton, Miss Green and the Merry Men will present a "Templeton arrangement of 'Caro Nome' from Verdi's 'Rigoletto.'"

For his musical impression, Templeton will present a piano parody, "Beethoven Takes a Lesson from Stephen Foster."
