BOWLING GREEN OFFERS SUMMER SPEECH COURSE

ROAD PROJECT TO BE STARTED EARLY IN APRIL - (Lima News Bureau) - KENTON, March 29 - The improvement of a 3-mile stretch of the Nigger Island-rd. plan, of which have been submitted by Hardin-co Engineer Russell L. Harvey to state WPA officials for approval, is expected to start early in April.

The project, which also will include the moving of the Shepherd ditch about 40 feet from the center of the road, will employ 72 WPA laborers for about three months. Detailed figures, job schedules and other data have been turned over to WPA officials.

The estimated cost of the project has been set at \$17,347 with the federal government furnishing more than two-thirds of the cost, all of which is located in the local labor force. The federal labor cost has been set at \$11,598, the sponsor's share \$7,038 and the federal material, \$1,313. The improvement is sponsored by the Hardin-co commissioners.

Local WPA and Kenton city officials also are awaiting approval of the N. Cheryl-st project which provides for the grading, widening, macadamizing and placing of curbing and gutter along a three-block stretch at the north end of the street.
