"Putting on the plain glasses is a trick in itself." he said. "They can't be dry, or they'd irritate the eyeball. So they made me up a bottle of what they call buffer fluid. which is concocted from my own tears. They ticked my eyes to get the tears. "It seems that everybody's tears

are of a slightly different chemical

"So there I was with my new eyes, but they still were gray. I thought it would be easy to paint brown irises on the lenses, but that wouldn't work because of ir-

"By then I really was getting intcrested in the problem. So was the laboratory, my physician, and an artist who happened to be doing my portrait. "The artist finally did evolve a

non-irritating brown paint but that wasn't a success either, because when I'd roll my eyes there'd be a little slippage and it looked like I had two eyes in each socket. "So I did some figuring and de-

cided that if I could tint the buffer fluid, my problem would be solved I tried argyrol and it seemed to work fine, except that my doctor pointed out it contained nitrate of sliver. He said that if I left it in long enough, the whites of my eyes would turn a permanent black, like photographic plates, so I quickly discarded argyrol. SUGGESTIONS
