Roosevelt, Dewey Talk Tonight; WLS Stars Mark 16th Anniversary

Addresses by President Roosevelt and Dist. Atty. Thomas E. Dewey of New York and a 16th birthday celebration at WLS will headline tonight's radio bill.

The president will address dinner meetings of Young Democratic clubs at 9:45, and will be heard through WMAQ, WBBM, WGN, and other stations on the three major networks. Dewey's speech will be aired by WBBM and other Columbia network stations at 9:15.

Former stars of WLS will join Roy Rogers, western movie actor, and present artists at the Chicago station in tonight's birthday party. Rogers, Tony Wons, and Bradley Kincaid will appear on "The Last Hour" at 11 p. m. Kincaid also will take part in programs at 7:30 and 10:15 and Wons will appear at 9 and 10:30. The celebration will be on the air from 7 to midnight.

500 Attack Kansas Relay Records

LAWRENCE, Kan.—(U.P.)—Records that have stood for a decade were on the spot today as 500 track and field stars from 60 universities and colleges competed in the University of Kansas relays.

The record seeking effort started Friday when the first five events in the decathlon were held with E. Lee Todd, versatile performer from Boulder, Colo., coming up with a halfway lead that gave him a chance to repeat his victory of last year.

Todd, now a graduate student at Colorado university, was a Hastings, Neb., college undergraduate last year when he won the tough 10-point program by five points. Today he started the last five events with a 29-point lead over Walter Arrington, the big Michigan State star. Todd had 3,754 points and Arrington 3,725. Close behind were Uval Jones, Wayne university, Detroit, and Leroy Floyd, Oklahoma A. and M. college. There were 14 in the field, but the others apparently did not constitute a serious threat.

The oldest record the stars will be shooting at is the 9.4 seconds mark for the 100 yards, made in 1930 by Leonard of Texas Christian. Gene Littler, the sensational Nebraska university sophomore, and Myron Piker, Northwestern's flash, are favorites in the "century" race and Orville Mattheus, Oklahoma university's fleet football and track star, has plenty of support.

Other records include the four-mile relay mark of 17:37.8 set by Illinois, and the leap of 25 feet 4¼ inches made by Gordon of Iowa. Both were set up in 1931. A six-year-old record likely to stand is the 4:21.7 mile made in 1934 by Glenn Cunningham.

It was on this track that Cunningham first began to attain fame as a miler, and this afternoon he was to appear for what may be his last Kansas appearance. Gwinn Henry, director of the relays, arranged a special mile and Archie Sinni, of the North Texas Teachers college, twins, will complete the field.

Cunningham, no longer the master miler, has been training here, and there is talk of a 4:10 mile for the old star's valdictory.

There are seven university class relays and one expected to produce the keenest rivalry is the mile. The Oklahoma Aggies will be defending their 1939 title and Minnesota's crack quartet is an equal favorite to win. In the field events Beatus Bryan, of the University of Texas football player who also pole vaults, will try to improve the record of 14.2 feet he set last spring. Elmer Mackney, the intercollegiate shot-put champion from Kansas State, also will be shooting at his own record of 52 feet 1½ inches.

Mellen Students Strike in Protest to Firing Coach

MELLEN, Wis.—(U.P.)—Three hundred Mellen high school pupils tried to decide during the weekend whether to return to their classes Monday or to continue on strike in protest against the dismissal of Athletic Coach Arne Larson.

They deserted their classes Friday and marched with placards on the main street. Six members of the school board who met earlier this week voted unanimously against renewing Larson's contract for another term.

The pupils' placards said "We Want Larson." They also hung up cards and painted signs on business places bearing the same legend. A petition was submitted to President W. Taggart of the school board urging that Larson be retained.

Superintendent C. L. Johnson warned the strikers that they would be disciplined when they returned to their classes.

Larson came to Mellen in 1935 and won 58 basketball games while losing 18 during his five seasons as coach. The Mellen team represented its district in the state tournament at Madison in 1938.

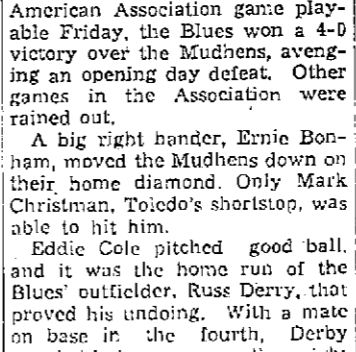
A big right hander, Ernie Bonham, moved the Mudhens down on their home diamond. Only Mark Christman, Toledo's shortstop, was able to hit him.

Pine Bluff Woman Wins Protest of Father's Will

A circuit court jury Friday decided 10 to 2 in favor of Mrs. Mary Schmitz, Pine Bluff, in her suit to break her father's will and recover property she claimed she owned for 34 years.

Mrs. Schmitz's suit was directed against Chris Schmitz, Pine Bluff, executor for the estate of her late father, Ferdinand Schulenberg, Cross Plains, and several others. Mr. Schulenberg, the complainant stated, gave his daughter a three-acre piece of property in 1904 as a marriage endowment, but willed it upon his death in February, 1939, to Carl Schulenberg, Cross Plains contractor.
