

Raymond Massey Will Enact Young Abe Lincoln On Air

Fay Bainter And Otto Kruger Added To Cast For Drama; Templeton Will Present Anne Jamison, Soprano

One of the truly great performances of all the time will be heard when Raymond Massey plays the little role in Robert E. Sherwood's "Abe Lincoln in Illinois" as the Radio Theatre feature presentation on Monday, Cecil B. DeMille will be at the production helm when the Pulitzer Prize winning play that was transformed into a successful movie is broadcast over WABC at 9:00 p. m.

The addition of Fay Bainter and Otto Kruger to the cast, makes the play loom up as one of the stellar attractions of the season. Fay Bainter will be cast in the important role of Mary Todd with Otto Kruger playing the part of Ninian Edwards, her brother-in-law. Ninian is the state senator who interests himself in Lincoln's political career acting as a friend and counsellor.

Anne Jamison, soprano, will be guest on Alce Templeton Time, Monday, April 22, at 9:30 p. m., EST, over the NBC-Red Network. Alce and his entire cast including Pat O'Malley, his Lancashire friend, William Miller and the chorus and Daniel Saldenberg's orchestra, will broadcast from the Highland Park, Ill., high school auditorium in a charity benefit performance.

Highlighting his Monday "Tune-Up Time" program, Andre Kostelanetz will broadcast the air premiere of songs from "American Jubilee," musical extravaganza billed for the New York World's Fair this summer. The tunes, written by Arthur Schwartz, are "How Can I Ever Be Alone," Tennessee "Fish Fry" and "Bicycle Girl." Tony Martin and the chorus will chime in with the lyrics.

Other numbers are "I've Got My Eyes on You" by Kostelanetz, Martin and the chorus, a special orchestral arrangement by Kostelanetz of Hoagy Carmichael's "Stardust," a medley of "Wind and the Rain in Your Hair" and "Singing Hills" by Martin, a rendition of Johann Strauss' "Artist's Life" waltz by the orchestra, and "Beyond the Blue Horizon" by the ensemble.

Strauss' famous waltz, "Tales from the Vienna Woods," will be offered by Margaret Speaks, soprano soloist during the broadcast Monday at 8:30 p. m. over WEA. Miss Speaks will sing "Cowards Will Follow," "Over the Land Is April" by Ernest Chorley, and Romberg's "Softly As in a Morning Sunrise." Alfred Wallenstein will conduct the orchestra in Rossini's Overture to "The Italians in Algiers," "Love's Dream After the Ball" by Czibulka, and Halvorsen's "March of the Boyards."

A musical tour of Czechoslovakia will be taken by the Contented crew, under Josef A. Pasternack, Monday at 10 p. m. over WEA. The orchestra will play the Dance of the Comedians, from Smetana's "The Bartered Bride," and Dvorak's "Slavonic Dance." Fibich's "Poem" will be presented by voices and strings. The Continental Quartet, Lullaby Lady Opal Craven, and chorus will offer other native numbers.

"Parole—to the Streets," drama of a youth on probation who wants to "go straight" but being unemployed is soon again at odds with the law, will be heard during the "Youth in the Tolls" broadcast, Monday, at 7:15 p. m. over WJZ.
