### NLRB Tells Firm to Hire 42 Men

WASHINGTON—(U.P.)—The National Labor Relations Board Tuesday ordered the Milan Shirt Manufacturing Co., Milan, Tenn., to give jobs and two years pay to 42 persons whom it refused to hire in May, 1938.

The NLRB said that the company had refused to hire the job applicants because they were known to be members of the Congress of Industrial Organization's Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America.

Such a refusal, the board said, was a violation of the Wagner Labor relations act which bans discrimination in regard to hire . . . to encourage or discourage membership in any labor organization.

"Clearly the appropriate remedy to effectuate the policies of the act is to order that the tenant (the company) offer employment to the persons named . . . and make them whole for any loss of pay each may have suffered as a result of the tenant's refusal to hire them," the board said.

### U. W. Psychiatrist to Address State Nurses' Meeting

Dr. Joseph Pessin, instructor in neuro-psychiatry at the University of Wisconsin, will be a discussion leader during the regional meeting of the Wisconsin State League of Nursing Education at St. Francis hospital, La Crosse, Saturday.

The subject of the discussion will be schizophrenia. Others to take part in the meeting will be Dr. Samuel Wick, senior physician, Milwaukee county hospital for mental diseases, and Mrs. Irma Levering, supervisor of psychiatric nursing, Milwaukee county hospital.

Esther Klingmann, chairman of the mental hygiene committee of the Wisconsin State Nurses assn., will preside at this meeting which is open to all nurses.

### Cromwell's Glad to Confirm An August Baptism

OTTAWA—(U.P.)—Mrs. James H. R. Cromwell, the former Doris Duke who inherited a \$30,000,000 tobacco fortune, will become a mother next August, Cromwell said Tuesday.

"Yes, it's true and I am glad to confirm it," the United States minister to Canada said.

Cromwell, then an advertising executive and amateur sportsman, was 37 and his bride 23 when they were married at New York on Feb. 13, 1935.

It was her first marriage, his second. Cromwell has a daughter, Christine, 18, by his first marriage to the former Delphine Dodge, automobile fortune heiress.

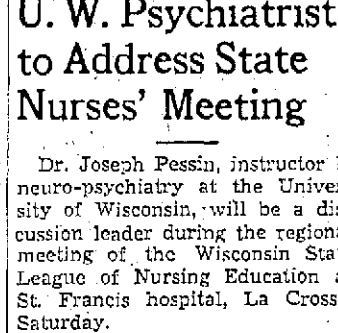
