

SPECULATION IS CURTAILED

Fears of Unexpected European Developments Make Traders Weary

NEW YORK, May 4 (AP)—Fears of unexpected European war developments over the week-end caused the trimming of speculative sails in today's stock market.

Trends were indefinite until the final hour when light selling put a number of leaders down fractions to a point or so.

While efforts of the administration to halt the spread of the overseas conflict and keep Italy out were consulting to financial quarters, the presence of the big Allied fleet in the eastern Mediterranean revived some market apprehension as to eventualities in that part of the world.

Steel was up for a while, as forecasts were heard of an upturn in next week's mill operations.

In arrears most of the time were General Motors, DuPont, General Electric, Loft, International Paper Preferred, American-Hawaiian Steamship, Phelps Dodge, Montgomery Ward and Consolidated Edison.

Resistant were Chrysler, Sears Roebuck, Johns-Manville, Consolidated Oil, Kennecott, and American Telephone.

Bonds and commodities were a trifle ragged. American securities moved up at Amsterdam, only important foreign market open today.

Without much recovery steam in the curb were Gulf Oil, Aluminum of America, Croco Petroleum and United Light & Power.

Market analysts studied the federal reserve summary disclosing the country's department store sales in the week ended April 27, were up only 1 per cent over the comparable period last year.

In the preceding week the year-to-year increase amounted to 7 per cent.

Encouraging was a compilation by the air transport association of America indicating the seasonal upswing in passenger traffic continued in April, establishing a new high record for the second month in succession.
