## STUDENT CONFERENCE ON PUBLIC AFFAIRS OPENS ON FRIDAY AT BLUFFTON

BLUFFTON, May 15—Twenty Ohio colleges and universities will participate in the annual Student Conference on Public Affairs to be held here Friday and Saturday. Conducted by the International Relations club of Bluffton college, the conference will be sponsored by the college Y. W. C. A., the Y. M. C. A., the Peace Action club and the Thespian dramatic society.

Speakers and advisors include Dr. Edgar Dale, professor of education, Ohio State university; Dr. George M. Patton, professor of economics, Ohio Northern university; Dr. Harry J. Sarkis, professor of history, Findlay college; Dr. Joseph E. Shafer, professor of economics, Bowling Green university; and Dr. Lloyd L. Ramseyer, Dr. J. S. Schultz, Dr. C. Henry Smith, Dr. J. W. Bauman, Prof. Noah Byers, and Prof. Marjorie Poston, all of Bluffton college.

Registration will be held in College hall from 11 a. m. to 1 p. m. Friday. The opening session will feature an address by Dr. C. Henry Smith, professor of history at Bluffton college. A panel discussion will follow. Topics to be discussed are—Government in Business, Propaganda and Civil Liberties, the American Far Eastern Policy, and the United States and World Democracy. Delegates and guests will attend a tea to be given in Musselman library at 4 o'clock.

At 6:30 the banquet will be held in Ropp hall dining hall. The speaker for the occasion will be Dr. Edgar Dale, of Ohio State university, who will discuss "Public Opinion and Propaganda." At 9 o'clock the Thespians will present a dramatic production in the Tom Thumb theatre. Saturday's events include a breakfast to be served at Ropp hall dining hall at 8 o'clock; a business meeting for committee reports and adoption of resolutions; luncheon, 12:30, at Ropp hall; and a concluding session at 1:30 p. m. at which the election of a host and a president for 1941 will be conducted.

## RED CROSS COMMITTEES REPORT PROGRESS IN CAMPAIGN FOR \$6,000

Preliminary plans having been completed, Allen-co chapter, American Red Cross, at a luncheon meeting Tuesday noon at Argonne hotel officially widened its campaign to raise \$6,000 or more for relief of Europe's war sufferers.

John E. Galvin presided as chairman of the meeting which was addressed by Besse Kinsey, Red Cross field representative of northwestern Ohio.

"The American Red Cross has a solemn duty to perform," said Miss Kinsey. "Our Washington headquarters knows the terrible conditions existing in Europe. We must raise the \$10,000,000 as quickly as possible to prevent widespread suffering and starvation. The American public always has been generous in times of disaster, and in this disaster, the greatest of all, we know that we shall not fail."

Mrs. W. B. Kirk, executive secretary of the local chapter, announced that hundreds of letters appealing to civic leaders and others have been mailed and responses should be received in the next few days.

Committees to contact manufacturers, merchants, banks, schools and every resident of the county indicated that progress has been made and chairmen predicted that as soon as Lima and county residents realize the urgent need for immediate help they will send their contributions to the local office of the Red Cross.

Special committees are being arranged in the various service clubs and within a few days a complete organization will be set up in the schools under the supervision of school officials and the Junior Red Cross.
