CONVENTIONS DO HELP ONE PURPOSE served by a convention of the Blackwood type, which tells one player about the exact number of aces held by his partner, is the showing up of paychic bids by the opponents. Many a victory is boasted by users of bizarre calls, in keeping their antagonists from reaching slams which cannot possibly be beaten.
