A new front is being installed in the Triplett block on Main-st, occupied by the Community Market.

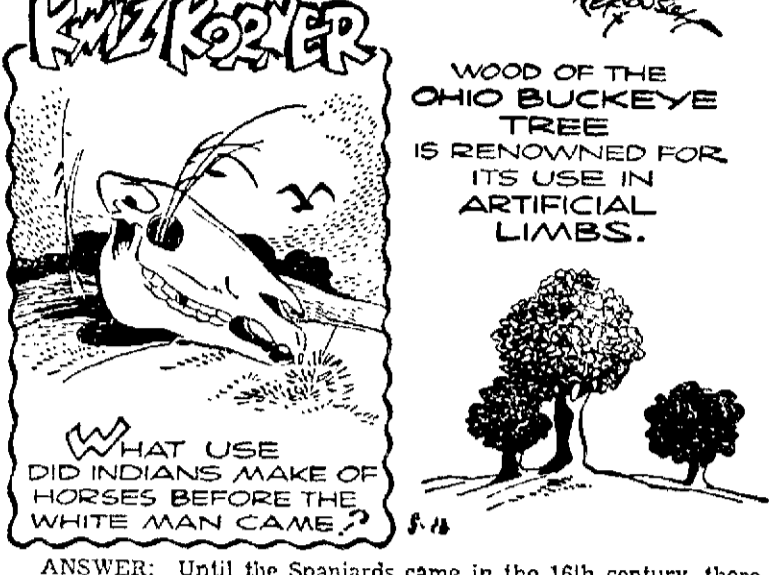
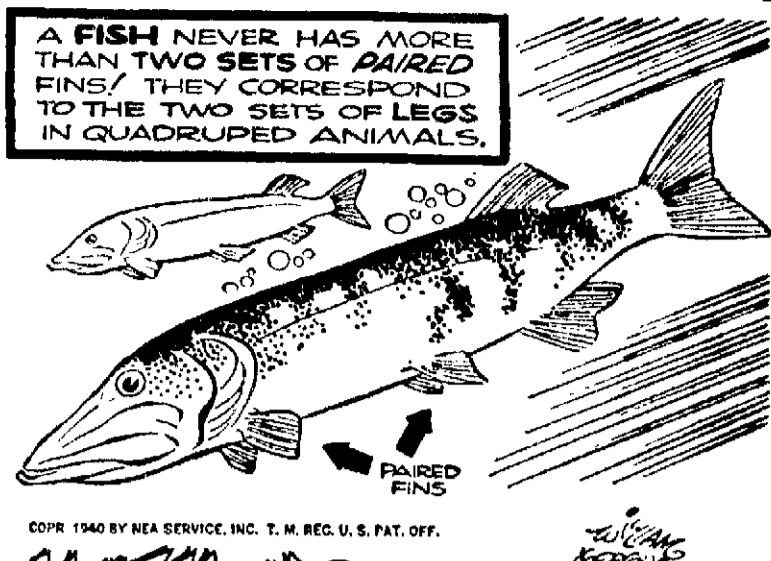

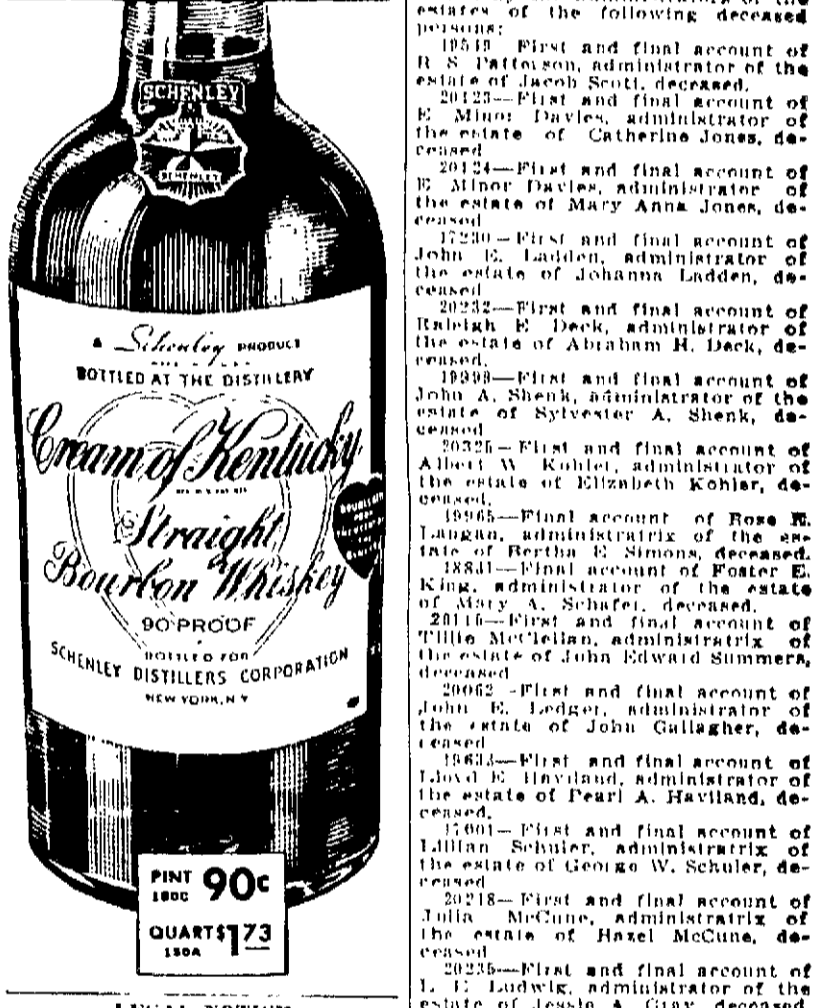
