Invasion Puts Diamond Price Higher

Madison jewelers report that although diamond prices have gone up considerably since the advent of the British blockade prices are expected to rise 100 to 250 per cent because of the invasion of Holland and Belgium. Because the manufacture of

these diamonds depends upon trained workers, Henry Van Dam, New York diamond expert, said the production of such stones could not be easily transferred to another country. It would take from three to four years - and huge expenditures—to set up a small diamond manufacturing industry here, he explained.

Before the invasion of the low 25,000 and 30:000 trained workers compared with about only 3,000 in Holland, Van Dam said. "During the last war Holland

produced about 50 per cent of the total world supply and was a neutral throughout the war. Today, the source of supply has been completely cut off," he said. . . .


