LIMA HOSPITAL INMATE PRESENTS PROBLEM OF "WHO GETS THE MONEY"

When David Mitchell, 26-year-old colored burglar escaped from the Lima State hospital May 14 authorities expression opinion that he would be found without a bit of trouble but on Friday Cincinnati authorities reported that he had furnished them with a "who-gets-the-money?" problem. Arrested Thursday by Cincinnati police, he had \$6,190 in old bank notes in his tattered pockets. He told detectives he found them in an empty waterfront house indicated on a map drawn by "Phil," an otherwise unnamed fellow prisoner who died nearly two years ago.

Cincinnati officials Friday afternoon were to come to the Lima hospital to check to see if a "Phil" had died in the institution at that time. He was a white prisoner, they were told.

Action to claim the money was started Friday by three persons, it was reported. A few weeks ago in Cincinnati officials ruled "finders keep" when some city relief laborers dug up a box of old gold coins on a city project.

The three possible claimants are: Miss Ruth Niederlehner, an attorney, who applied for appointment as Mitchell's guardian on grounds that he could not claim the money because he had been adjudged insane.

Second, Mrs. Sonora Wilson, wife of the owner of the house where the cache was found, who instructed her attorney to file a claim.

Third, private detectives working for the American Surety Co. investigated a possibility that the money was taken in a bank messenger hold-up in Covington, Ky., 18 years ago.

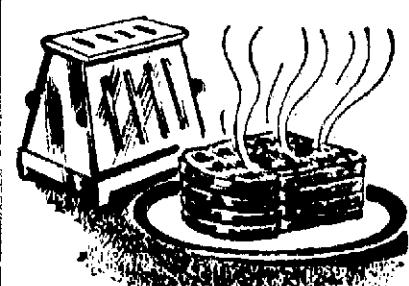
Local Red Cross officials Friday received the following telegram from national headquarters:
