MILWAUKEE -- (U.P.) -- A committee of nine parents, indignant because of a faculty shakeup, sought legal advice today on what to do to "get rid of" the board governing the La Follette school of Wauwatosa township.

A school board meeting attended by 300 protesting parents was thrown into an uproar Thursday night by a fist fight between Ned Turano, school director and clerk of the board, and Albert Barnekow, town supervisor. Turano, officers said, leaped from the stage of the basement auditorium upon Barnekow while the latter was talking with Turano's brother, vice-principal of the school.

Ned Turano pounded Barnekow's face until the latter wrenched free. Sheriff's deputies separated them as women acreamed hysterically. Barnekow retired, bleeding. ### Relief Bodies Face Growing Meeting at Portage Load in State

Possibility that Wisconsin general relief agencies will carry heavier burdens this summer than in any comparable period was reported today by the state depart-

ment of public welfare. Past summers have shown a considerable decline in the numper of cases receiving general relief, but April of this year equalled the record of March and came within a few cases of last year's April count which was the highest for any year since the Work Projects Administration came into existence.

"The sudden change in the relative intensity of the general relief problems in the state is a direct result of the recent WPA cuts," the department stated. "Despite downward private employment trends, the WPA dropped 2 net 4,500 needy workers from its rolls between March and April."

Possibility of the record summer relief burden was anticipated on the basis of a further cut of 5,500 WPA workers during the first two weeks of May.
