HOLLYWOOD, May 25.—Short takes: The war-shrveled picture market almost certainly will bring to this continent a policy of varying admissions for different priced productions. Also a swing away from double bills.

"G W T W" proved that people will pay more if they believe a film is exceptional, and now all the major studios are discussing new selling plans. It does seem reasonable that box office prices should be higher for a \$2,000,000 flicker than for some little cheapie just out of the B category.

But I haven't heard any talk of lowering the present level of admissions to meet low standards; they seem intent only on raising it occasionally to pay for the epics.

There has been so much war news on the air lately that a local announced said: "We now interrupt these news flashes to bring you a radio program."

With Shirley Temple out of 20th-Fox, you may expect to see Jane Withers in bigger and better films. The Withers career has been held back all these years in favor of the studio's other kid star.

Miss Temple, you may be sure, has no notion of complete retirement. First thing her parents did during the break-up was hire a prominent agent for her. . . . Incidentally, this department's ears are still pricking from the shrill details of the story printed here several weeks ago in which the Temple-Zerkow break was predicted and explained.

DIXIE'S PLACE—Still going strong are those famous Del Rio cowboys. They really pack 'em in to the rafters here.


MOONLIGHT TERRACE—Dancing under the stars gives out Saturday and Sunday nights.

CLEVELAND MAN IS GIVEN LIFE

CLEVELAND, May 25—(AP)—Clarence Rost, 22, of Cleveland, was convicted tonight of first degree murder with a recommendation for mercy in the tavern slaying last Jan. 29 of George Blazie, 65-year-old bartender.

Immediately after a jury of seven men and five women reported their verdict, Common Pleas Judge Samuel H. Silbert sentenced Rost to life imprisonment in Ohio penitentiary.

The prosecution charged that Rost fatally beat Blazie in a \$19 robbery at the Track Inn here, and then went to the west coast.
