FDR, First Lady to Highlight Today's Radio Programs



The first family of the land spotlights the airwaves today. President Roosevelt returns for a "fireside chat" at 8:30 p. m. while Mrs. Roosevelt highlights the Red Cross War Appeal at noon. Details and stations of these programs follow:

12 m.—Red Cross Appeal (WBBM, WIND, WENR); besides Mrs. Roosevelt, Norman H. Davis, national chairman, and guests Eddie Cantor, Jack Benny, Bob Hope, Jimmy Durante, Judy Garland, Ted Husing, Vivien Leigh, Gertrude Lawrence, Walter Houston and Clifton Fadiman.

8:30 p. m.—President Roosevelt (WIBA, WMAQ, WGN, WCFL, WENR); first talk to the nation since declaration by Great Britain and France of the existence of a state of war with Germany—presumably on national defense and preparations.

White Faces Watch Practice Blitzkrieg

'Obsolete' Planes Still Scare Troops

WITH THE UNITED STATES ARMY ON MANEUVERS, NATCHITOCHES, La.—(U.P.)—Sham battling American troops got a sample of aerial blitzkrieg last week.

The effect on them, even in mock warfare, was not pleasant to see.

I was in one of those flying rotor coasters which plummeted down at 250 miles an hour on soldiers in the open Thursday. We caught them crossing a pontoon bridge and skimmed not more than 15 feet above their heads. They fell face downward and we could see their blanched faces as they dropped.

Our speed seemed terrific, but at 250 miles an hour we were doing less than half the speed credited to the German dive bombing Stukas.

As you hurl over cars on the highway, skim by trees in meadows, swoop down on troops in field, you know what speed is. And as you reach your mission, and roar down on a bridge lined with troops, you have a giddy feeling, are inclined to throw your head back and laugh as you see the power you have, the fear you can instill in fellow humans.

These attack planes are powered by two engines (one of them would fly the ship easily), six machine guns point downward from the wings. But these ships already are obsolete. A new one is on the way capable of 400 miles an hour, carrying 80 light bombs.

Participating in these maneuvers was the cream of the United States air force—a fleet of gigantic four-motored, bombers which can carry tons of bombs; the fast P-36's, and the steady B-18 medium bombers.

A squadron of nine attack planes led by Capt. Frank Armstrong had left Barksdale field, Shreveport, to begin a day which was to see more than 200 planes in formation over the area. I rode with Lt. A. J. Bird, a red-faced, red-haired pilot who does not know the meaning of fear.

Attack planes they call them "light bombardment" now to the disgust of picked men who fly them—fly low over trees, theoretically machine gunning troops,
