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Story Of Prison Life Told In Unusual Film At Lyric

"Those High Gray Walls" Is Title Of Hit; "Too Many Husbands" Second Movie On Double Bill

"Those High Gray Walls," a stirring story of a country doctor serving a prison sentence for allowing his humane instincts to outweigh respect for the law, commences Tuesday at the Lyric theatre. Walter Connolly, great actor who died last Tuesday, portrays the doctor and is supported by Iris Meredith and Onslow Stevens. Completing the program is "Too Many Husbands," a delightful comedy starring Jean Arthur, Fred MacMurray and Melvyn Douglas.

the point of a gun. By a ruse, Cagney gets the gun away from him. The plot revolves around O'Brien's efforts to keep Cagney in the tropics, and the various ruses by which he manages to do it.
