Sotkowskie also was sentenced to six months in the Milwaukeecounty house of correction. The court was told Helen Sotkowskie got a divorce from Theodore in 1927. Theodore was ordered to pay \$25 a week for the support of Helen and her five children. In August, 1935, she asked her husband be held in con-. tempt of court, charging that he had not paid her during the nine; years since their divorce. Court records substantiated her claim. A warrant was issued for Theodore's arrest, but police could not find him.

In 1929 Mrs. Sotkowskie remarried. Theodore remarried on May 20, two weeks ago. Saturday night Theodore and his bride mot his former wife and her spouse in a tavern. An argument followed. His former wife reminded the sheriff's department of the warrant. Deputies arrested Sotkowskie.

Theodore's former wife told the court the county had supported her children. Sotkowskie admitted he had \$1,000 coming from his mother's estate at Wausau, prompting the court to order the district attorney to order the Marathon county authorities to repay the money to the Milwaukee relief department.




