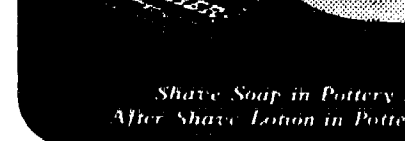
WILL CONFER HONOR
