U. S. SCHOOLS TO TRAIN WORKERS

Instructions In Trades For National Defense Is Planned

WASHINGTON, June 10—(INS)—A comprehensive and well organized plan to train 1,250,000 skilled workers for trades essential to the national defense program was outlined today by Federal Security Administrator McNutt following conferences with representatives of major national educational organizations.

Vocational schools and engineering colleges are now training 500,000 youths and adults for the needed occupations and the trade schools could be expanded to more than double this figure in less than a year's time. U. S. Commissioner of Education John W. Studebaker informed McNutt.

These schools, staffed by 35,000 trained and experienced teachers represent and investment of more than a billion and a quarter dollars, McNutt said.

Educators from all parts of the nation conferred today with McNutt and Studebaker and reported on specific types of service that can be provided by high schools and colleges.

ALLIES EXPAND WAR PURCHASES

Range Of Orders Widened To Items Besides Aircraft And Tools

NEW YORK, June 10—(AP)— Allied war purchasers, who have heretofore concentrated mostly on aircraft and tools, now are tapping United States industry for a assortment of other weapons and materials.

Wall Street sources said today British and French agents suddenly appeared to have widened their range of orders and inquiries to speed equipment plans and replace losses. Total orders placed since September are now estimated at \$1,300,000,000 and the figure is expected to grow rapidly.

The new German drive, it was pointed out, threatens important industrial sectors in addition to those already engulfed by the Nazi advance in northern France and the low countries. High-speed marine engines, shells, increased steel tonnage and a big powder plant at Memphis to supply Allied needs have been purchased recently.

An atmosphere of intensified activity pervades the big British and French buying offices in the downtown financial district, close to headquarters of many of the nation's industrial concerns.

Of the estimated \$1,300,000,000 Allied orders the overwhelming bulk has thus far been for aircraft and accessories. Airplane contracts signed or in prospect approximate \$1,200,000,000. Probably \$700,000,000 in contracted orders, mainly aircraft, have been delivered by the manufacturers, an informed source said.

To avoid giving the enemy information, spokesmen for the commission purposely have been vague, also specifying that "more than 8,000 warplanes" have been ordered in this country.

TWO NEW WAR WEAPONS BARED BY DETROIT

DETROIT, June 10—(INS)—Two near-sensational implements of war—a super-fast, fully armored pursuit airplane and a speedy anti-aircraft combat car—were described today by Preston Tucker, president of the newly formed Tucker Aircraft Manufacturing Co.
