TOLD BY TEACHER The history of the language itself offers some interesting points. Its author was a Russian physician, Dr. L. Zamenhof, born in 1859 in Bielostok, where the spectacle of the feuds of the four races -each speaking a different lanton since 1936, and has graduted guage-which inhabit it (Russians, Poles, Germans and Jews) a total of 50 students. She was also instrumental in having the at an early date suggested to him the idea of remedying the evil by the introduction of a neutral ianguage, standing apart from the existing national languages.

Zamenhof, fearful of losing his medical practice if his identity were associated with the language, at first called himself "Dr. Esperanto," meaning "the hopeful one." When the language became more popular he disclosed identity and promoted the use of Esperanto.

Abandoning his original idea to resuscitate a dead language, Zamenhof constructed a new language on a priori basis. One great advantage was the failure of its predecessor, Volapuk. The mistakes which caused the downfall of Volapuk were avoided in the construction of Esperanto.

The Esperantists, avoiding another error of their predecessor, adopted the wise policy of suppressing all internal disunion by submitting to the dictatorship of the inventor, and so present a united front.

The use of a common language for international communication would do much to facilitate peace promotion, Miss Orloff believes. Already in South America the president and cabinet of Brazil are Esperantists. With its adoption by other countries a long step toward lasting world peace may
