Aqueduct We found George Cassidy sitting in a small green bus on the club house turn at Aqueduct. There was a Panama hat on his head and a sunburned, bored expression on his face. He had completed his first two stintshe works only five minutes every half hour-and he was waiting for his third. Cassidy was the perfect man for us. Not only does he earn \$100 a day, 200 days a year, but he is one of the most

prominent starters on the turf. The starter is the man who sends the horses away. Cassidy, who looks more like. a college half-back than a 32-year-old citizen of heavy responsibility, has been engaged in sending horses away for 18 years now. He broke, into the business under his father, who was a starter for 30 years. He worked 11 years as his father's assistant and now has been chief starter for five years himself.

Cassidy invited us into his green bus and soon we trundled around the track to the starting point of the third race, a sixhorses in this particular race and they were ridden by several prominent jockeys. We noted Don Meade on Ebony Fly and Jimmy Stout on State Witness. for two, but about that time Cassidy's four assistants-he usually has five, but one was sick-were geeing and hawing the horses into their stalls in the electric

This field went in rather easily so we climbed up a ladder with Cassidy and stood on the starting platform. He picked up a sort of handle with a button on it and stood without movement or expression until he pressed the button, ringing a loud bell and swinging ajar the hinged doors on the gate. 
