Kennel Club to Sponsor a Springer Field Trial Here

When a Dog Thrills His Master

One of the more intriguing sights to a lover of dogs is a field dog lawlessly running through his paces.

Madison will be treated to an exhibition of field work when the Madison Kennel Club sponsors an official trial July 7 in connection with third annual dog show at the Dane county fair grounds.

Restricted to Springer spaniels, the trial is under the auspices of the Dane County Sportsmen's league. Besides many local Springers, the kennel club anticipates a large number of entries from neighboring states.

The trial will be run in the oval in front of the grandstand, offering the gallery ample opportunity to watch the dogs hurrying through the marshy cover.

Dogs will be run in pairs, each having a well marked course within which he must stay at all times. The idea of a spaniel trial is to demonstrate the performance of a perfectly trained spaniel in the field.

The function of a hunting spaniel is to walk at heel until he is told to seek game. When so ordered he should hunt game in a brisk, quiet manner thoroughly quaterning the ground within gunshot without unnecessarily covering the ground twice.

When the game is flushed he should drop or "hup" and if the game is shot he should retrieve at command only, but in a trial not until the judge tells the handler to do so. The dog is required to retrieve quickly and to deliver tenderly to the handler. Any break in the skin of the bird from the dog's teeth is penalized. After delivering the bird the dog should stay "hupped" until given further orders. If a spaniel barks, "gives tongue," he is penalized.

If the spaniel in following a bird or rabbit is getting too far out of gunshot he must be called off and made to quarter. If the handler or gunners have to run after him in order to shoot he is considered out of control. Handlers may control their dog by hand, voice or whistle but only in the quiet manner.

Well trained dogs conserve game and one that marks the fallen game well, follows a strong running cripple, and retrieves, is of great value. To do this he must use the wind and follow directions of the handler.

The judges must judge the dogs for game finding ability, steadiness, and retrieving. In game finding the dog should cover all his ground on his course leaving no game in his territory and show courage in working through heavy thickets and bramble patches. He must be steady to wing and shot. That is he must at no time chase a flying bird or attempt to retrieve one that is shot until the command is given.

The rules provide that the gunners should use a well choaked double barrel shotgun using number six chilled shot and a load of not less than three drams of smokeless powder. The gunners work is most important. They should leave the bird get way out before shot so that the dog can show his retrieving ability.

The official guns at the trial will be Frank Mazamet and Rudolph Wagner, Madison, and Peter Blankenheim, Sauk City. The judges are James Berry, Milwaukee, and J. Paul Bishop, Clarendon Hills, Ill.

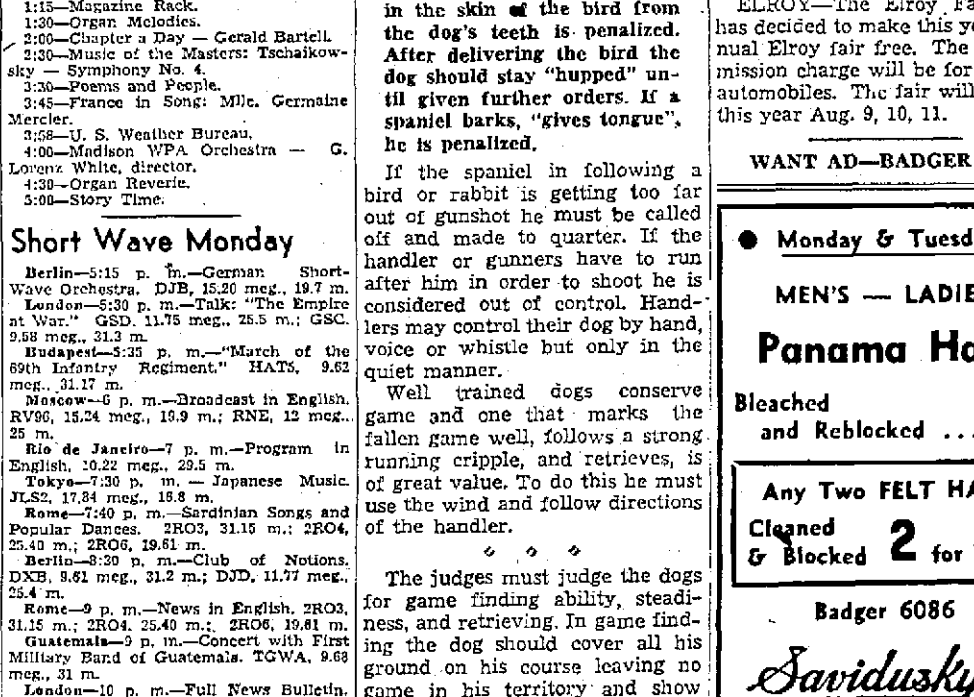

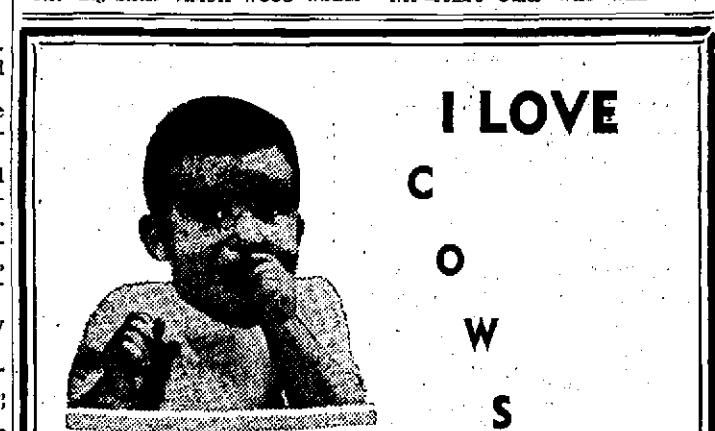
