

Jane Froman Scheduled On Musical Americana Program

Show Moves To Tuesday Night Spot; Great Talent Lined Up For "We The People"

Jane Froman, popular singing star of stage, screen, and radio, will be the first guest soloist on Musical Americana when the program moves to its new Tuesday night spot. The program will be heard each week at 8:00 p. m., over WJZ.

Ezra Stone, whose "Aldrich Family" is subbing for Jack Benny this summer (switching to Thursday nights beginning July 4); Elsie Robinson, the columnist; a survivor of the battleship "Maine," and a girl who makes her living by getting tossed out of bed are among the guests to be interviewed on Gabriel Heatter's "We, The People" Tuesday, at 8:00 p. m., over WABC.

A medley of Stephen Foster's best loved works will be Fred Waring's observance of the composer's birthday week. The Pennsylvanians will devote their program of Tuesday to interpretations of Foster's works.

The Kentucky Colonels, of which group Waring is a member, is presenting a Howard Chandler Christy portrait of Stephen Foster to the Old Kentucky Home at Bardonia on the Fourth of July, the anniversary of Foster's birth. The smooth strains of "Thoughts While Strolling," Meredith Willson's original theme tune, marks the opening of another top radio program Tuesday, over WEF at 8:30. Billed as "Meadith Willson's Revue," it replaces Fibber McGee for the summer and brings an easy-to-listen-to program of favorite songs of the past played by Willson's 32-piece orchestra, vocals by Kay St. Germain and Ray Hendricks and comedy by Cliff Nazario. The program idea is Willson's own, having proved it popularly some years ago under the title of "America Sings." Songs will be offered without title announcement or explanation, except at the end of the program.

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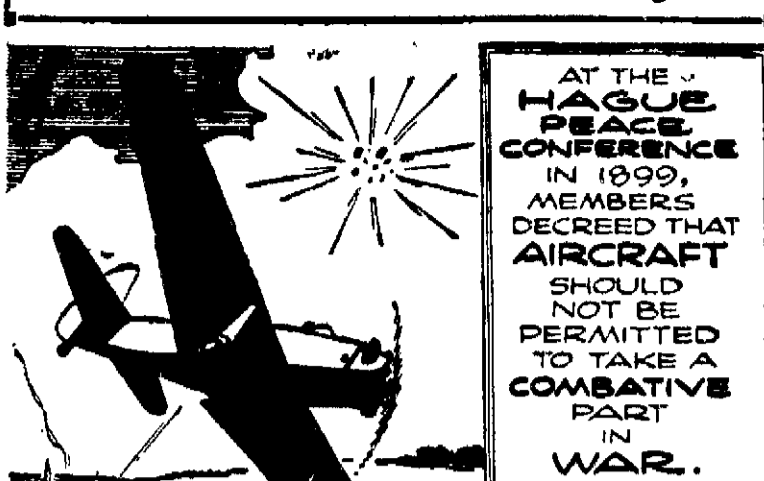

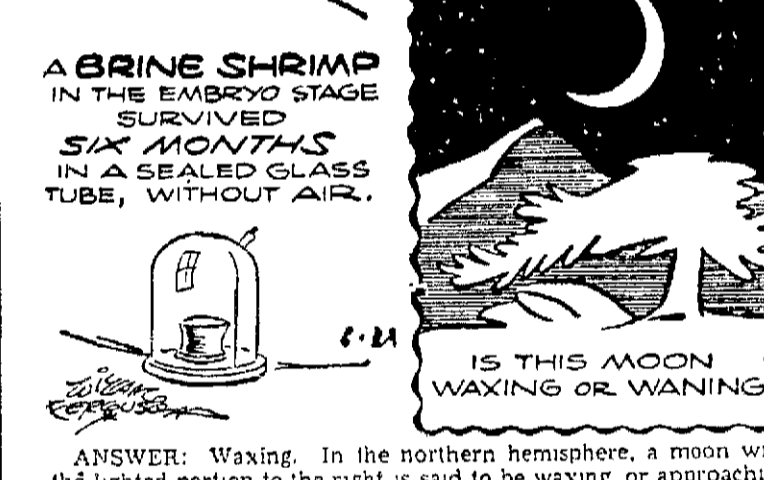

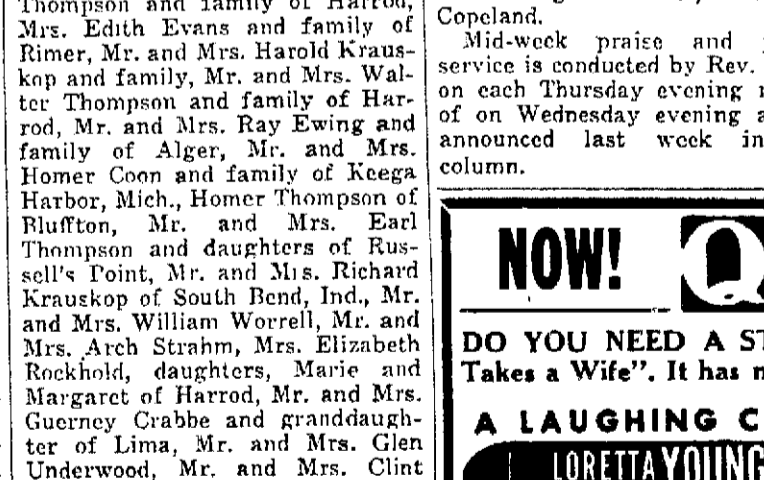

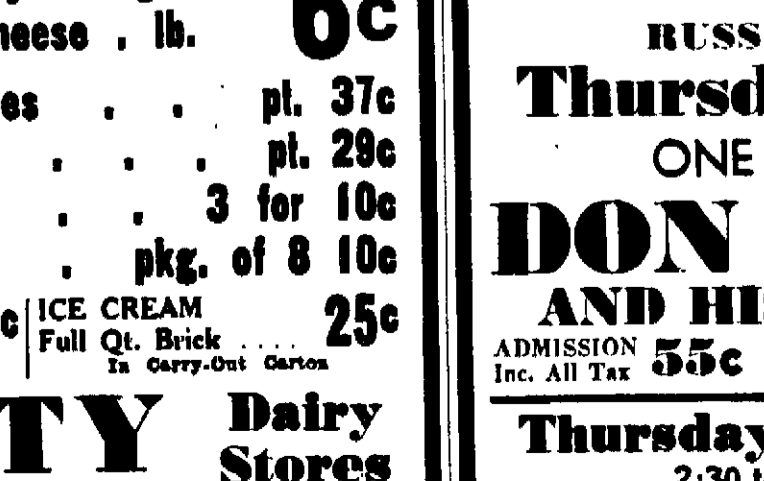

Showing for the last time Tuesday will be "Dr. Kildare's Strange Case," with Lionel Barrymore and Lew Ayres in the lead roles.
