500 to Open U. W. Music Clinic Monday

More than 500 high school student musicians and directors of music from all parts of Wisconsin and 24 other states will attend the 11th annual music clinic at the University of Wisconsin from Monday to July 27.

Sponsored annually by the school of music, the clinic gives music directors and student musicians of high schools an opportunity for three weeks of intensive study under some of the nation's foremost teachers.

Last year about 500 directors and students attended the clinic, and attendance this summer is expected to be as large, according to Prof. Leon L. Iltis, of the school of music faculty, who is director of

the clinic.

High school student musicians who enroll in the clinic are eligible to become mem-bers of the All-State band, orchestra, or chorus, and participants in the work of these organizations, each of which gives several concerts

during the period.

The All-State band, composed of more than 300 pleces, will again give a con-cert this year during the final program of the Milwau-kee Mid-Summer festival in Milwaukee on July 20, Last summer the band played to an estimated audience of 150,800 persons at the festival's final program.

An outstanding faculty has again been secured for the 1940 clinic, which is not only the oldest music clinic of its kind in the United States, but is now the largest and most complete: Although its large enrolment annually represents more than 200 high schools scattered throughout Wisconsin, clinic officials are anxious to have every high school in the state represented.

Indian Youth Wins Forum Art Prize

NEW YORK -A 17-year-old Indian boy, Ben Quintana, Cochitti Pueblo, N. M., was announced Saturday as the winner of the \$1,000 first award in the art division of the annual American Youth Forum competition, in which 494,548 high school students participated.

Young Quintana, descendant of the cliff dwellers, submitted tempera painting of Indian life which won the unanimous vote of the judges for first place. The second award of \$500 goes to Elliott Twery, of the Theodore Boosevelt high school, Washington, D. C., and third award of \$100 to Robert Bursiel of Greeley high school, Greeley, Colo.
