CAMPUS BULL JUDGED BEST

Rothschilds Refugees in U.S. \$1,500 Fine, Spared Prison

THE WISCONSIN STATE JOURNAL

George McGhie, former Chicago broker, was spared a penitentiary sentence, but was fined \$1,500 by Federal Judge Patrick T. Stone Friday when he pleaded nolo contendere (no defense) to 10 counts in an indictment charging mail fraud, securities law violation, and conspiracy.

McGhie was indicted in Janu-

ary, jointly with Lester W. Rothe, former senior statistician in the state banking department, who is serving a Waupun prison term on state charges.

McGhie was accused of hav-ing paid \$20,000 to Rothe for the "priviege" of purchasing securities of delinquent banks in which Rothe was in charge of liquidation.

Five of the original 15 counts against McGhie were nolled on motion of U. S. Atty. John J. Boyle, who pointed out the mail fraud charges carry a possible maximum penalty of five years each and a maximum fine of \$1,000 each.

Judge Stone, however, refrained from imposing imprisonment and gave McGhie a 90-day stay to pay the \$1,500 fine after a plea by Atty. Stanley M. Ryan, who pro-duced a group of McGhie's neighbors and former business acquaintances to vouch for his previous good record. McGhie has lost his home and his business, having surrendered his broker's license, and while he made a "mistake" paying money to a public official, Ryan told the court, he was "taken in by Rothe" and had no intention of defrauding the state banking commission. He made no actual profits in his dealings with Rothe, Ryan declared.


