'Strong Man' Batista Leads Cuban Vote

HAVANA, CUBA — (U.P.) Col. Fulgencio Batista, Cuba's "strong man," claimed a three-totwo lead over Dr. Ramon Grau San Martin today in a presidential elec-tion which had cost at least six lives and had brought angry charges of fraud by Grau San Martin supporters. Batista was gaining

Batista, who rose from an army sergeant-sienographer to be colonel commanding the fighting forces after the deposition of Gerardo Machado in 1933, was confident of victory.

Opposition leaders, however. asserted there had been fraud and for the Batista coalition. Joaquin Martinez Saenz, leader of the ABC party which supported Grau San Martin, said he was confident the courts would hear and support protests which would be made. The entire country was reported

quiet today but there had been considerable disorder Sunday.

Despite a guard of 1,800 police. specially armed with ritles at

Batista's order, a fleet of 75 police radio cars and strong patrols of soldiers and sailors, gunmen sped by the headquarters of Jose Ramon Sancerni, a Batista supporter, in an automible, pistols blazing.
