The charges were lodged by Dist. Atty. John P. McEvoy on complaint of two crusading ministers.

State Patrol to Get Short Wave Radio

Officers of the state traffic patrol soon will benefit by the use of police short wave radios in at least 20 cars in those areas in the state now covered by existing police radio broadcasting facilities, Col. George W. Rickeman, commissioner of motor vehicles, announced today.

Radio receivers have been ordered, Rickeman said. Installation is expected shortly.

Patrol cars also will be easily identified by new insignia on the sides of the cars. According to Homer G. Bell, director of enforcement and in direct charge of the patrol, the design is similar to that of the official patrol badge and bears the words, "State Traffic Patrol, Motor Vehicle Department, Wis."

New license plates also will be issued for the patrol cars and will bear a star and the words, "State Traffic Patrol," as well as identifying numbers.

Red police type warning beacons are attached to the front and rear of the patrol cars to warn other users of the highways when such vehicles are on emergency calls or stopped along the highways while apprehending violators or rendering assistance at the scene of an accident.

Officers of the patrol, now 45 in number, also will be given advanced instruction in first aid, Rickeman said.
