"All This And Heaven Too" Set For Premiere At Ohio

Bette Davis And George Brent Starred; Mickey Rooney Film To Show During Day Thursday And Continuing Friday

"All This And Heaven Too," long-awaited screen version of Rachel Field's widely-read novel, will have its premiere engagement at the Ohio theatre at 8:30 p. m. Thursday. Bette Davis and George Brent are the stars of the dramatic film. Showing during the day Thursday and continuing Friday will be "Andy Hardy Meets Debutante."

Two pictures that people are still talking about from their original showing years ago have been returned to the Quilna theatre for re-showing. "The Awful Truth," starring Irene Dunne and Cary Grant, comedy which set an ideal years ago, and "Lost Horizon," starring Ronald Colman, are the films.

At the Sigma theatre one of Hollywood's ablest boy players, Billy Lee, has the top role in a new drama of life, in "The Biscuit Eater." Billy is the touching central figure who befriends an outcast hound and turns him into a champion. Also showing is "You Can't Fool Your Wife."

Clark Gable and Claudette Colbert are the stars of the Lyric feature, "It Happened One Night," a gay romantic comedy that was hailed as Hollywood's supreme comedy. Co-featured at the Lyric is "Mr. Deeds Goes to Town," with Gary Cooper and Jean Arthur in the unforgettable story of the lovable American character, Mr. Deeds.

Bing Crosby and Gloria Jean sing the favorite tunes of the day in the State feature, "If I Had My Way," with El Brendel, Charles Winninger and Donald Woods. The immortal favorite of school children, "Swiss Family Robinson," is told in all its stirring dramatic essence as the co-feature with Thomas Mitchell starred.

Irene Dunne, the Theodorable screen comedienne, scores mightily in the comedy role as Lucy Warriner in "The Awful Truth," which returned to the Quilna theatre. It remained for her hilarious clowning in "The Awful Truth" to reveal the treasure-trove of talent in her inimitable personality.

This gay, madcap story of the Warriners, played by Miss Dunne as Lucy and Cary Grant as Jerry, is so uproariously funny it should make the annual ten best list in a walk. The fun starts when Jerry and Lucy decide to separate with the only bone of contention the custody of Mr. Smith, their wire-hair terrier.

The court allows Mr. Smith to Lucy but permits Jerry to visit the dog. Thus many of the film's outstanding comedy scenes arise out of Jerry's visits to Lucy's apartment while she is entertaining impatient suitors.

Le Affaire Warriner takes its most ludicrous turn, however, when Jerry announces his engagement to a flighty young thing with a social register background. Lucy, determined to win Jerry back at all costs, attends the sumptuous engagement party, posing as Jerry's sister, and by actions totally unbecoming a lady, manages to have herself and her "brother" thrown out on their collective ear, "Colossal" was coined for just such a scene.

Irene and Cary, teamed for the first time, are, of course, superb. Ralph Bellamy gives a deliciously hill-billy flavor to his Oklahoma oil tycoon. The veteran Cecil Cunningham plays Miss Dunne's dour Aunt Patsy. Alexander D'Arcy is excellently romantic as the French vocal teacher.

"The Awful Truth" is handsomely mounted.
