MAPS FOR NEW RURAL ELECTRIC LINE PREPARED

KENTON, Aug. 3—Maps of project "C" of the United Rural Electric, Inc. local unit of the Rural Electrification Administration, have been sent to the federal REA officials at Washington, D. C. it was announced by W. C. Ewing, local superintendent. The closing date for filing was July 31.

The new project will cover from 60 to 75 miles of lines and will serve approximately 200 persons, Ewing said.

Project "B," which is nearing completion, will cover about 110 miles of lines and serve some 325 customers. Project "A," which already is completed, includes 307 miles of rural electric lines and is serving more than 1,000 rural consumers, Ewing said. They are located in Hardin, Allen, Auglaize, Logan, Union and Marion cos.

IRISH HILL—Feature that should bring additional droves of patrons is the lowered admission price for the Saturday night dance session.

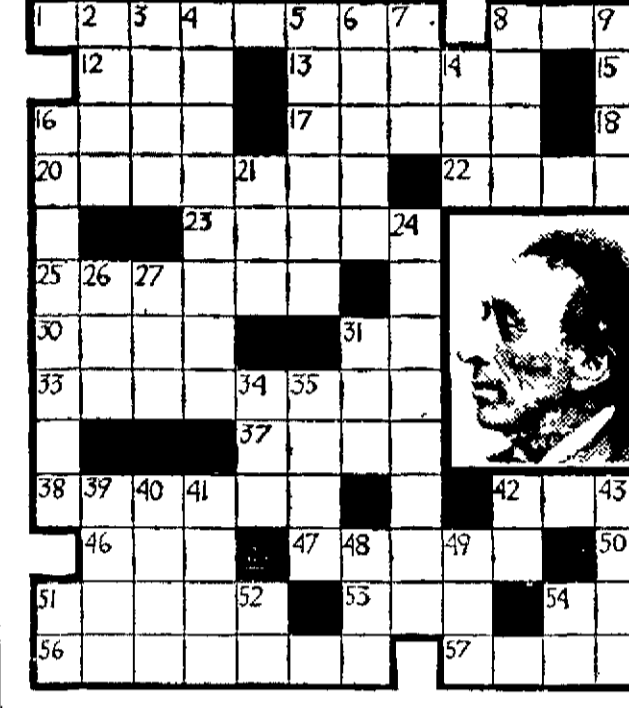
BLINKING OWL—Mighty fine collar they put on the beakers. The Owl continues its old tradition of serving nothing but the finest sandwiches.

OLD BLUFFTON LANDMARK IS BEING REMOVED

(Special To The Lima News) BLUFFTON, Aug. 3—One of the old landmarks of Bluffton is being torn down this week as a result of condemnation proceedings instituted by the state fire marshal's office. The old weather-beaten red painted former business house on N. Main-st, next to Big Riley creek, will give way to a more modern and fireproof building.

Work on razing the structure was started Wednesday morning by a wrecking crew from Mt. Cory. The structure consisted of two rooms, one of which has been vacant while the other housed the David Basinger blacksmith shop. Basinger moved his shop to the home of his sister, Miss Lydia Basinger, on W. Elm-st, Tuesday evening.

Old records here have furnished no clue as to the date of the building was erected, but older residents of the community recall that 60 years ago it housed the wagon shop of Chas. Gustweier and Lawrence Fisher.

The place was identified with the oil boom when in 1896 William Kimmel operated a saw mill and made rig and derrick timbers. 11 198 Charles Burns set up a carriage paint shop. Basinger has used the building for blacksmith purposes since 1932.
