

Those 'Bad Girl' Parts Are Good for Marlene; She'll Keep Them

HOLLYWOOD — (U.R) — Marlene Dietrich put down her cup of coffee, took a puff at a cigaret, and announced she didn't want to be a good girl in pictures.

The horrible thought that some day a movie producer might cast the languid Miss Dietrich as a busy American housewife fussing with the dishes after supper while Junior tugs at her gingham apron no longer need bother us male moviegoers. For Marlene intends to keep playing the girl with a past, although for variety's sake, she hopes it will be a different kind of past in each picture.

The exotic Miss . Dietrich was having a between-scene cup of coffee when we burst into her dressing room where Director Tay Garnett and hulking Broderick Crawford were amusing themselves by asking her to pronounce "Massachusetts," It came forth something like "Mass-e-shush-its." And every time she said it. Garnett and Crawford doubled over with laugh-

Garnett merely is director and Crawford a leading player in Miss Dietrich's current picture at Universal, "Seven Sinners," so we shushed them and their Massachusetts gag out of the dressing room for the more important business of studying a lady with a cinematic past,

We asked if Miss Dietrich ever, heaven forbid, would play a good girl in pictures. "But good girls are not interesting," she said, casting a

pitying look at us. "There is no mystery about good girls. They just grow up, get married and have children. In real life this is very nice, very substantial and as it should be. But in pictures such girls do not bring those 'ahs' from the audience that are very pleasing to an actress. They can go home and

see that every day in their own homes. They want something different in pictures, and I try to give it to them. "There have been great

love stories about just a boy and a girl, stories like 'Romeo and Juliet' and 'Seventh Heaven,' but they are so rare and the others are such weak imitations that they lack all human interest. I do not think I am the type to play Juliet or Diane and so I wish to continue being a lady with just a little mystery about

"Some of the greatest women in history were not good women in the sense that they married, reared families, and didn't look at other women. And yet they are the most interesting characters in history, Take Cleopatra, Helen of Troy, Josephine, the Empress Catherine of Russia-all fascinating characters — and all with traits we might consider just a little bad.

"I am a European by birth, although I now am an American citizen, and in Europe women are taught to be a little restrained, to keep a little of the mystery of a woman about them. I admire your frank, athletic American girls, but I cannot be like them. My background, my training in the theater and my whole life have been

along different lines. "One thing that I could not understand for a long time in the United States is the way your public figures, in pictures, the theater and in political affairs, are allowed no

privacy. "I do not choose to be like some people in the theatrical world who try to lead entirely cloistered lives - always shunning to be seen in public and running away from admirers. I admire them tremendously because they have set a course and are following it. It is their right to

do so if they please.
"But I will say this, if a

person has maintained this air of mystery about his or her personal life and suddenly lets down the bars and meets the public, what they reveal must be good or it will be a great disappointment to their followers. To hide something for years and then show that nothing was hidden because there was nothing to hide is disastrous."
