

Broadcast From Navy Ship Listed For "We The People"

Night Battle Maneuvers On Heatter's Program; Lanny Ross And Sylvia Froos Guest Star On Musical Americana

The first on-the-scene radio broadcast from the U.S.S. Wyoming during actual night battle maneuvers, carried out by 600 Midshipmen Reserve trainees, will be heard on Gabriel Heatter's "We The People" over WABC, Tuesday at 8 p. m.

Lanny Ross, tenor star of radio, concert, and the movies, will be singing guest master of ceremonies on Musical Americana, Tuesday, at 8 p. m., over WJZ. Ross will be soloist with Raymond Paige and his orchestra on the program, which also features Sylvia Froos, popular songstress, as guest soloist.

Audrey Marsh, young blues singer recruited as a soloist from the Swing Fourteen, vocal group, will sing "I Can't Resist You" as a featured number on the "Johnny Prescent" program Tuesday, at 7 p. m. over WEAF. 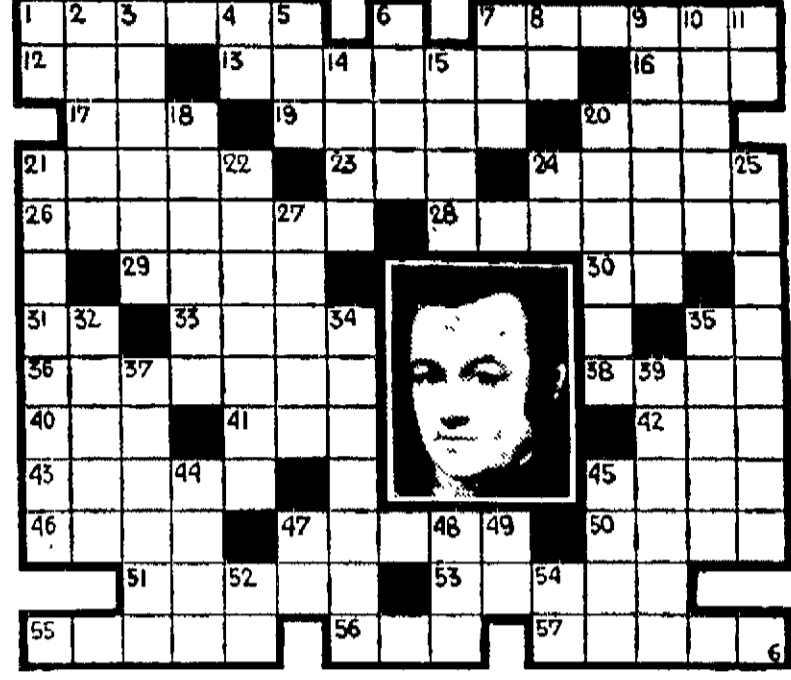

Attraction Will Star Claire Trevor And Walter Pidgeon; Quilna Hit Packed With Comedy

Scheduled to open Wednesday at the Ohio theatre is "The Dark Command," an action picture dealing with the troubled days of the Civil war. It stars lovely Claire Trevor, Roy Rogers and Walter Pidgeon. Ending Tuesday is "They Drive by Night," a hit featuring Ann Sheridan and George Raft which is packed with thrills and romance.

Romance ashore and laughter afloat! That's the kind of action-filled, appealing entertainment you'll find in "Sailor's Lady," current Quilna hit which features Nancy Kelly and Jon Hall. Second attraction is "Lucky Cisco Kid," a tale of a fighting caballero who is framed by a crooked judge.

"The House Across the Bay," which opens Wednesday at the Sigma is the story of a beautiful and alluring woman who is left in a hostile world when her husband is convicted for income tax invasion and sent to a federal prison. In the cast are Joan Bennett, Lloyd Nolan and Walter Pidgeon. Also on the bill is "The Outsider," with George Sanders and Mary Maguire.

One of the greatest aviation pictures filmed in recent years is "Sky Devils," current Lyric attraction which features Spencer Tracy, William Boyd and Ann Dvorak. Second hit picture is "Two Thoroughbreds," with Joan Brodie and Jimmy Lydon.

All the starring roles are important, but to Ida Lupino falls one of the meatiest of the season. Called upon to play a decidedly unsympathetic character, she imbues the role with so much vitriol and psychological understanding that when the annual plot is taken, her performance will stand out as one of the most flawless of the year. Miss Sheridan plays a basically good person with a flippant, yet earnest air about her. She is sincere in her love for Raft and sticks by him in his ups and downs.

With George Raft and Joan Bennett sharing stellar honors and a strong supporting cast featuring Walter Pidgeon, Gladys George, Lloyd Nolan and June Knight, "The House Across the Bay" will have its initial showing at the Sigma theatre on Wednesday.

The central figure in the picture is Brenda Bentley, played by Miss Bennett, a young girl confronted with the problem of adjusting her life to a strange fate when her husband is sent to prison for income tax evasion.

This role, which is outstandingly dramatic, gives the alluring Miss Bennett wide scope as she is seen as a singer and dancer in addition to her dramatic opportunities. In one sequence of the film she sings and dances "Chula Chihuahua," her own interpretation of the South American rumba, and later introduces "I'll Be a Fool Again." This, of course, is a radical innovation for the actress.
