## 31 Indicted on Vending Machine Count

CHICAGO — (U.P.) — A federal grand jury Wednesday returned mail fraud indictments charging 31 men with defrauding scores of midwestern investors of more than \$800,000 through fraudulent sale of 100,000 peanut vending machines.

The government charged the defendants sold for \$35 each machines which cost \$7.50 to manufacture, then leased the machines from the investors on promises of huge profits which never were received.

Wisconsin victims mentioned in the indictment included Nona E. Hoskins, Richland Center, and Edna J. Millard, Sparta.
