South Sea Island Film Opens Saturday At Ohio

Bennett Family Comes To Life Again In Sigma Feature; Comedy, Drama Combined At Quilna

Jon Hall and Olympe Bradna find love and romance on their native island in the South Seas after many exciting, thrill-packed episodes which highlight "South of Pago Pago," commencing Saturday at the Ohio theatre. Frances Farmer and Victor McLaglan head the supporting cast. Showing for the last times Friday is "I Love You Again," starring William Powell and Myrna Loy.

The Bennett family, whom Jane Austen made famous many years ago in her celebrated novel of five marriageable daughters, comes to life again in "Pride and Prejudice," at the Sigma commencing Saturday. Greer Garson, Laurence Olivier, Mary Boland, Edna May Oliver, Maureen O'Sullivan, Ann Rutherford and Frieda Inescort are included in the cast. Ending their run Friday are "Opened by Mistake" and "Ladies Must Live."

At the Quilna theatre fans will find a well balanced program of comedy and drama with "Scatterbrain" and "Three Faces West" booked to commence at the Friday preview. In "Scatterbrain," Judy Canova, a hill billy soprano, is starred, with Eddy Foy, Luis Alberni and Alan Mowbray aiding in the comical touches. Showing for the final times Friday is "The Man I Married."

Demonstrating how far under-world big-shots will go in their efforts to buy protection, "One Hour to Live," opens Friday at the Lyric theatre. Charles Bickford, John Litel and Doris Nolan are the stars of the picture, a smashing indictment of crooked officials who betray positions of trust for illicit personal gain. Also featured is "The Masked Phantom," a rugged outdoor drama of two-fisted smashing lumberman, "King of the Lumberjacks" is now at the State theatre. John Payne and Gloria Dixon are starred in the romantic leads with Stanley Fields in the role of number one menace. Also showing is "Forty Little Mothers," starring Eddie Cantor.

The stormy romance between a beautiful Mexican dancing girl, an American gambler and a colorful Mexican gambler, forms the basis of "The Girl and the Gambler," at the Majestic theatre. Leo Carrillo, Steffi Duna and Tim Holt are the stars. Also showing is "The Ex-Champ."

"South of Pago Pago," the epic of South Seas romance and intrigue, will have its premiere at the Ohio theatre on Saturday. An impressive cast is headed by Jon Hall, who won sensational fame as the hero of "The Hurricane." Other important names in the cast include Frances Farmer, Victor McLaglan, Gene Lockhart, Douglas Dumbrille, Olympe Branda and Francis Ford.

Briefly, the story of "South of Pago Pago" concerns the strange adventures of Bucko Larson and Ruby Taylor, who undertake an expedition to a fabulous pearl bed "South of Pago Pago." Overcome by greed and lust for wealth, Larson uses all kinds of foul methods to ensnare the natives on the island of Manoa so that they will dive for pearls. Kehane, the young and handsome son of the island chief, falls in love with Ruby, never dreaming that she is a Singapore cafe girl. Things go from bad to worse for the innocent natives until a swift and unexpected climax brings the showdown. How Ruby manages to save the day for the islanders and to free them from Larson's cunning and violence pro-

vides the picture with an ending packed with thrills and drama. The principal location site during filming of "South of Pago Pago" was on the famous Kona coast on the island of Hawaii, the largest in the group. Here 2,000 natives were employed, 300 canoes were assembled and an entire native village built on the beach near the foaming surf. However, for technical reasons, it was necessary to make many of the key scenes on a sound stage, so Producer Small called in his noted art director, John DuCasse Schulze, and com-

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mitted him to build an exact replica of the village. For the luau, or native feast scenes, it was necessary to match the tropical fruits and fish plates known only to the islanders. Three Hawaiians who make a living by staging genuine luaus for Hollywood parties, were engaged as technical experts. For three days, it was necessary for the principals to continually eat the native dishes.

Another famous romantic classic has been brought to the screen in "Pride and Prejudice," picturization of Jane Austen's gay comedy, starring Greer Garson and Laurence Olivier, which commences Saturday at the Sigma theatre.

Teaming Two Academy Award nominees of last year, the amusing story deals with the romance of Elizabeth Bennet, eldest of five unwedded daughters living in a small provincial English town, and Darcy, handsome, wealthy young aristocrat, who comes to town as a visitor. Mrs. Bennet, the girls' flutery mother, has her cap set for any eligible bachelor who comes within her vision. Darcy falls in love with Elizabeth, but cannot stand her family. But Darcy finds that family pride is not nearly so strong as love and in the end he comes to the rescue when Elizabeth's sister, Lydia, runs away with an adventurer, Wickham. This brings Elizabeth and Darcy together again.

One of the season's most notable supporting casts is featured in the film, headed by Edmund Gwenn

and Mary Boland as Mr. and Mrs. Bennet, Edna May Oliver as the crochety Lady Catherine de Bourgh and Melville Cooper as her stuffy librarian, all highlighted comedy roles. The sisters of Elizabeth are charming Maureen O'Sullivan as Jane, Ann Rutherford as Lydia, Marsha Hunt as Mary and Heather Angel as Kitty. Others in the cast include Bruce Lester as Mr. Bingley, Frieda Inescort as Miss Bingley, Edward Ashley as Wickham, Karen Morley as Charlotte and E. E. Clive as Sir William Lucas.

Following up the cycle inaugurated by "Boy Meets Girl" and later, "Once in a Lifetime," Hollywood offers another contribution to the list of motion pictures that have been made about motion pictures in "Scatterbrain," Judy Canova tarrer which is scheduled to open at the Quilna theatre on Friday night.

Eddie MacIntyre, breezy press agent, talent scout and right hand man to J. R. Russell, producer-director of "Perfection" produces and stars in "Perfection," a comedy and in the Ozarks and have her "discovered" as an authentic hill-billy to be starred in Perfection's new picture, "Thunder Over the Ozarks."

Repercussions of the Nazi invasion of Austria are dramatized in "Three Faces West," which also stars Friday at the Quilna theatre. The story deals with the tribulations of a Viennese physician, a refugee from a Nazi concentration camp, who finds refuge, and a new chance to be of service to humanity in the dust bowl region of America's midwest.

BISHOP FAVORS SENDING SHIPS

Cincinnati Churchman Says Destroyers Should Be Sent Immediately

CINCINNATI, O., Aug. 16.—(UP)—Bishop Henry W. Hobson of the Episcopal church today urged that the United States sell great Britain additional naval destroyers.

In a letter sent to a group of newspaper editors, Bishop Hobson said that "practically we are fools and morally we are criminals" if the destroyers are not made available.

"The United States has 125 destroyers which we do not need," he said, "while the greatest need we have against future war with totalitarian states, the British navy, is being destroyed."

"Letting England buy 100 destroyers now would be the best insurance against war we could possibly buy."

"The fact is before us that no amount of money voted now for defense will save this country from Hitler domination if the British navy is surrendered or destroyed. The totalitarian nations have made plans whereby thru economic pressure and military threats the Nazi influence will be extended over North and South America."

OLD TURBINES DISMANTLED FOR JUNK PILE (Special To The Lima News) ST. MARYS, Aug. 16.—Four obsolete turbines are being dismantled now at the Central Ohio Power Co. house. Two of them are 700 kilowatts and the other two 400 kilowatts. All four have been in use since 1902, and formerly generated current for the old Western Ohio railway cars.

The turbines generated 25 kilowatt current, now largely replaced by 60 kilowatt current, so that there was no use for the machines any longer.

The four turbines were sold as junk to a Findlay dealer who is supervising their removal from the power house here. The flywheel of the 700 kilowatt turbine weighed 50 tons alone. One of the spokes of the wheel weighs slightly more than six tons or 12,000 pounds.

In order to remove the turbines they are out into sections with the use of a blow torch. The pieces are loaded onto trucks to be conveyed to Findlay.
