# He Meets 'Pastor Hall Challenge

HOLLYWOOD - (U.P.) - Apparently a member of the Roosevelt family, to be happy, must be swamped with work. James Roosevelt, so busy he hardly has time to catch his breath, reports he is enjoying himself "immensely" as a motion picture producer.

After waiting through three conferences and a couple of longdistance telephone calls, we finally cornered the son of the president in his office at United Artists studio for a report on his activities in Hollywood.

"After nearly two years of studying how things are done in Hollywood," he said, smiling as he stretched his long legs behind his desk, "I am now arranging for the distribution of one picture, making plans for the production of another, completing eight short films, and doing a few things that come under the heading of community activities."

Roosevelt said he had undertaken the American distribution of the controversial British film. "Pastor Hall." He also is preparing to start production on his first feature film, "Pot O' Gold," and is finishing up the last of eight short films for a nickel-in-the-slot movie organization. In addition, he is an official of the motion picture relief fund and finds time for other civic enterprises in Hollywood.
"I saw the Pastor Hall picture

in New York some weeks ago," he said, "and it impressed me as one of the strongest I had ever seen. And when I was told that no motion picture company 'dared' distribute it in this country, it struck me as a challenge. I inquired if the American rights were available and I acquired

"I then had the picture run off for mother, and she was equally enthusiastic about it. But she felt it needed something to tie it down to American picture audiences and offered to speak the prologue to the film. Robert E. Sherwood, the prominent playwright, assisted mother in writing and editing the prologue.

"People who saw the film greed it carried an enormous emotional impact but a few felt it might be interpreted as giving one side, the British side, in the current conflict abroad.

"The story is based on the case of the Rev. Martin Niemoeller, the German minister who was sent to a concentration camp for expressing his religious views which conflicted with the views of his government.

"To me, the picture is not anti-Nazi but anti-totalitarian and pro-democracy. If releasing this picture seems to place me in the position as taking a stand, I am willing to have that stand be antitotalitarian and for democracy."

Turning to his forthcoming feature film, "Pot O' Gold," Roosevelt believes he has something original to offer to the public. large sum of money.

# Light Shows Ready to Cheer Theater Goers

(United Press Drama Editor) NEW YORK-(U.P)-Whatever the 1940-41 theatrical season turns out to:be when all the votes are in next spring, it looks like a safe bet at this time to predict that there will be few productions on the heavy side. Most of the plans laid so far involve comedies. farces, and musical shows, apparently on the theory that things are tough enough out-side the theater without the patrons being exposed to more travail inside.

The depressing international situation does not make things entirely rosy for lighter theatrical entertainment, however. There are certain plays also songs, sketches and bits of business for musical shows,

which will not be used because they treat satirically or burlesque cer-tain world events or figures which no longer can be longer can be jibed at for laughs without leaving a bad taste in the customers' mouths.

Of course, there will be some who will venture to use such material, but for the most part the producers will fight shy of it on the old theory that it won't pay.
