"Mill schedules are most congested in heavy products. Structural shape deliveries have lengthened steadily, and in some instances engine ring contractors have complained of inability to obtain shipping promises.

duction a year ago was 15,105 "Railroad demand for steel is gaining moderately, influenced by car repairs as well as by a fair volume of new equipment buying. Fabricated shape and concrete reinforcing bar orders continue numerous, and the large volume of work still being figured assures

sustained activity. "Export markets tend to lag slightly in some products, althoheavy shipments continue, particularly to Great Britain and Can-

"Scrap prices are moving up ward more rapidly, advancing the composite 33 cents last week to \$18.83, same level as in early

A vacation shutdown by leading producers brought the Pittsburgh district's operating rate down 6 points to 80 per cent last week. Detroit showed the only other decline-4 points to 89.
