When it looks as if the contract is certain to be made, the courageous opponent will try to figure out some possible situation whereby there is still a remote chance to head it off. Frequently this must take the form of hoping your partner holds some one particular card and then play-ing as if you knew he held it. If he does, you are rewarded. If he does not, you may have presented the declarer with a trick or so he otherwise could not have won. But the risk is worth it.

Q would get ruffed. Trumps would be dropped, and two diamonds and the club J would furnish discards for all the losing spades, giving declarer six-odd. even though East held the spade A. If this was the situation, the contract could be beaten by leading a small spade to the A, winning the return, then leading a third spade. If East had three trumps to the J, the dummy would have to ruff high to prevent an over-ruff. This might then build a trump trick for East. Of course, the effort didn't work, but at least West was trying, at the cost of one trick.


