Civic Theater to Open With Political Play

Timeliness will keynote the opening of the Madison Civic theater's 1940-41 season, for it will bring a political satire to the stage just before the national and state elections.

The play will be "First Lady," in which Jane Cowl created the leading role. The comedy of life in the White House will be enacted Nov. 1.

Second offering will be "The Silent Witness," a tense drama, on Dec. 16. "The Great Barrington," which had a long Chicago run last season as a Federal Theater project, will be produced Jan. 17.

An English mystery with a dash of comedy—"Busman's Honeymoon"—will be offered Feb. 28. The play affords excellent opportunity for character interpretation.

Elwyn Strong, theater director, will make his Madison debut as an actor when he plays the dual name role in "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde" on April 11. "Best People," a light society comedy, will be the final production, scheduled May 16.

During the summer, the theater has been organizing committees and now is in the midst of its annual membership and season ticket campaigns. Tickets are being sold by members and at the Wisconsin Blue Print co., 16 W. Dayton st.

Studio hours for members have been held monthly during the summer, with one-act sketches making up the programs. Next will be Friday night.

The Journal's Book Shelf

DANCE, A CREATIVE ART EXPERIENCE. By Margaret N. H'Doubler. F. S. Crofts & Co. New York. \$2.50.

This book is a serious attempt to set forth the origins, importance, and possibilities of dancing as a creative art. It aims to give the physical, psychological, aesthetic and philosophic backgrounds of "Dance."

This is a big order, and I cannot say that it is successfully carried out, being marred by repetition of the book addresses. It is published in a series on physical education, but a teacher would have to search hard for any practical suggestions.

Miss H'Doubler is a noted teacher of the kind of "free" dancing (as opposed to ballet, or other forms in which one learns set steps) which we used to call aesthetic or interpretative; perhaps these terms assumed unfortunate connotations or limitations.

It is possible that the student or instructor of "Dance" might derive inspiration from her book, but they would still know only that the dance has to grow out of one's own impulse, imagination, and technical skill.

Even the assistance commonly given by music is denied; the best dancers I have seen have invariably used music as a source of mood and ideas, and their dance has been in perfect harmony with music; but Miss H'Doubler thinks the music should be merely an accompaniment for a previously conceived idea of the dancer—thus seeming to put the cart before the horse.

The practical result of this—as I have too often seen it—is something that looks to the audience like a misinterpretation of music—that is, a dance which does not fit the mood of the music at all, and creates therefore an impression of bewilderment and disharmony, usually augmented by the fact that the music—not ever have been considered important—is very badly executed.

But this is a digression from the book to the practical application of its principles; there is little excuse for such a digression, because the book is not at all concerned with practical application. Its chief purpose, after all, is to justify dancing as an art, and show what is to be gained from it, physically and spiritually. Miss H'Doubler has much that is wise to say on this subject.

Unfortunately in explaining the profundities of her subject the author has bogged down frequently both in her thinking and in her style, so

that one gets passages like this: "To develop a motor technique, and a fine discriminating kinesthetic sense to control it, is one of the solutions to the problem of dance education."

Why solution? It sounds as though the dance teacher, puzzled over what to teach, discovers she can teach exercises. This is probably what happens, anyway—but why not say so? There are oceans of indefinite statements such as this; the book is hard reading; which is too bad, because many readers will give up before they discover the wisdom that is there.

Personally I agree with Miss H'Doubler about the educational possibilities of "Dance," but I doubt whether one needs a profound understanding of aesthetic principles either to teach or to dance; in fact, a perusal of all the learned works referred to in the bibliography would, I should think, do much to destroy any spontaneous impulse to express oneself in dancing.

I am grateful for Wayne Claxton's drawings, which are truly informative.
