band, Rodney Nowakowski, will direct the combined schools. Miss Remmel, Madison resident widely known for her frequent appearance in dance performances and opera, will be ballet director.

Miss Conlon resigned from the public schools last year after 11 years' service. She was a graduate of the University of Wisconsin and has been in charge of campus ballroom classes for 12 years. She has written three widely used text books on social dancing, and directs the Wisconsin High Cotillion club and the Inter-Hi Dance clubs.

Nowakowski is a Wisconsin graduate and a member of the university men's dance group. He has appeared here frequently in Jolk dance demonstrations, and directed ballroom dance classes on the campus this summer. He will direct the ballroom department and teach fencing and folk dancing at the Conlon

Miss Remmel began her ballet training with nine years under Lenore Johnson, with whom Miss Conlon formerly was associated. She studied a year under Helen Gartz, of Madison and Chicago, and spent a year of intensive study with Edna McRae, internationally known Chicago ballet teacher.

In Chicago, she appeared with the Margo Koche and Muriel Kretlow dancers.

Miss Remmel returned to Madison for a year at the university, during which she was a member of Orchesis and conducted a school at Ft. Atkinson. A year ago, she took over the Audrey Medaris school. She has spent three summers with professional dance groups.

Miss Remmel will conduct opera ballet classes, made up of advanced dancers of both schools. Other members of the staff

Bird's Eye View of Summer Books

Within a few weeks the Jall book season will be in full swing, and The State Journal will then resume its regular book column.

During the summer a numher of books have been sent to The State Journal for review. Here is a summer round-up of them.

NON-FICTION Westward From Vinland, by Hyalmar R. Holand (Duell, Sloan and Pearce. \$3). A fascinating account of Norse discoveries and explorations in America from 982 to 1362 by a graduate of the University of Wisconsin.

Mt. Hood: A Guide (Duell, Sloan and Pearce, \$1.50). A handsome and practical guidebook prepared by the Oregon Writers Project.

White Water and Black Magic, by Richard C. Gill (Henry Holt, \$3). A beautifully printed book-marvelous photographs -- describing the search in the Amazon region for curate, a deadly poison used in treating spastic paralysis. An unusual book.

The Wind of Circumstance. by Harold Dearden. (Reynal & Hitchcock. \$2.75). Autobiography of an English sportsman and physician who has had a full life and writes well if not with artistic restraint.

Extra! Extra!, by Joseph Henry Jackson and Scott Newhall (Macmillan, \$1.50) describes just what goes on in a newspaper plant when an extra is published. This is well-illustrated.

The Pinpoint Planetarium, by Armand N. Spitz (Holt, \$2) is a popular guide to star gazing. It's readable, easy to understand, well put together and splendidly illustrated.

An American Exodus, by Dorothea Lange and Paul S. Taylor (Reynal & Hitchcock, \$2.75) is a book we wish every American could read and see. There isn't must text, but in marvelous photograps the authors record "human erosion" of American dust bowl families — the Joads and their neighbors. "So far as possible we have let them speak to you face to face", write the authors.

Paper Chase, by Alvin F. Harlow (Holt, \$2.75) concerns the amenities of stamp collecting", and any stamp collector will enjoy the book.

Ethan Allen, by Steward H. Holbrook (MacMillan, \$2.50) is a lusty biography of that lusty American - Holbrook, you'll remember, is the author of Iron Brew and Hoary Old Mackinaw.

Hotel in Flight, by Nancy Johnstone (Longmans, Green, \$3) carries on the personal adventures of the Johnstones an English newspaperman and his wife, and their business venture of building and running a hotel in Spain. This carries them through the Spanish war. Well done and

As I Remember Him, by Hans Zinsser (Little Brown, \$3) is assuredly one of the best books of the summer, one of those you'll want to reread someday. Done in the form of a biography, it is Zinseer's autobiography. A reflective, fine book.

Modern Self-Educator, by Henry Thomas (Stokes, \$2.75) is one of those short-cuts to knowledge - history, science, music, philosophy, literature -each in a chapter. It simply can't be done, even in this sensible attempt. Here's a sensible question: "What rank does Bacon hold in modern philosophy?"

The answer just below is that Bacon has been called "the most powerful mind of modern times." Sorry, we'll try to learn the hard way!

FICTION The Heart Is a Lonely Hunter, by Carson McCullers (Houghton, Mifflin, \$2.50) is the much-discussed novel by a 22-year-old girl about four people in a southern mill town. It's strange and dreamy, almost fuzzy sometimes, but the book is unusual in the convincing picture of a mute's effect on several lives.

The Customer Is Always Right, by Anne Pence Davis (Macmillan, \$2.50) is a light novel built around the people in a large department store in a Texas oil town. Amusing. The King's Men, by Johan Bojer (D. Appleton, \$2,50) is a gripping story of army life

during the tense period in 1905 just before Norway broke its union with Sweden. Widow's Peak, by Harriet Henry (Dodd, Mead, \$2) is a very light story, thick with romance and misunderstand-

This Land Of Ours, by Louis Zara (Houghton, Mifflin, \$2.75) is a long, absorbing historical tale covering the period from 1755 to 1935—the march across the Appalachians and the winning of the Northwest. Very readable.

"The Brewers' Big Horses," by Mildred Walker (Harcourt, Brace, \$2.50). A full-bodied novel by the author of "Dr. Norton's Wife" of a courageous woman who ran a brewery. A middle west setting, realistic people, conflict and

Mother Of The Smiths, by Lorraine Carr (Macmillan, \$2.50) is a tribute to a valiant mother who borrowed no fears from time and laughed her way out of trouble. She handles a somewhat difficult family with shrewd humor

MYSTERIES

Mr. Sandeman Loses His Life, by Eugene Healy (Holt, \$2). We found this one dull. Paul Craine is in it, and his friendly enemy, Detective Rocheleau, and Betty Craine, who is suspected of wanting Sandeman dead.

Maigret Travels South, by Georges Simeon (Harcoart, Brace, \$2). Get it at once if you haven't already read it! Maigret is superb. This one has two mysteries in it, as did the previous Maigret, and, hurry, there are more to come. French, dry, logical, excellent characterizations-far superior to the average mystery.

Donald Clough Cameron (Holt, \$2). A deceptive, fastmoving story about the murder of a nice girl's roommate. A dash of romance too. Murder on the Pacific, by

David Knox Patton (Dodd, Mead, \$2). We found this a little slow-some young diplomats on board ship might have been guilty, but you have a good hunch not one of

Case of the Frightened Fish, by William Du Bois (Little, Brown, \$2). A fast, lighthearted story whose web is punctured by a tabloid re-

Uncomplaining Corpses, by Michael Shayne, the likeable big Irishman, is now married -the home scenes are almost too cosy-but he manages to get into considerable trouble solving an unpleasant Miami

mess. Amusing.
"Virginia" (Oxford, \$3), Compiled by the WPA, this "guide to the Old Dominion" is one of the best WPA state guides we've seen-generously illustrated with fine photographs, complete, descriptive text, and handsome binding. It makes you want to set off for

Virginia immediately CHILDREN'S BOOKS Secret Water, by Arthur Ransom (Macmillan, \$2). A good story of boys and girls marooned for a week on an

island. On The Staked Plain, by Erick P. Kelly (Macmillan, \$2). For boys and girls 10-14, this is an axciting, illustrated story of pioneers in the Texas Panhandle—there's a buried

NEW HAVEN, Conn.-(U.P.) A musical manuscript, lost for about 500 years, has been discovered and given to the Yale University Library by Paul Melion, of Pittsburgh. Written in 1470 for the

court of Charles the Bold, the manuscript contains 57 compositions in five languages.
