## Undecided Group Sways Colorado

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the fourth of a series of political studies made by Donald Thayer, University of Wisconsin student, in a hitch-hiking poll of the western states.)

DENVER, Colo.—Wendell Willkie holds a slight lead in Colorado but the election is still to be won between now and November, for nearly a third of the voters are undecided.

### Personal interviews with a representative group of Coloradans show 15 will vote for Willkie, 13 for President Roosevelt, and 12 undecided.

The third term issue and the course of the European war during the next two months may settle the election, for while Republicans unanimously oppose a third term and Democrats favor it, nine of the uncertain voters are against it and three haven't made up their minds.

### Republicans are 11 to four against aiding Great Britain, Democrats five to three for it, with five undecided. The uncertain group opposes it seven to five.

Of Willkie's supporters five voted for Roosevelt in 1932 and seven in 1936. Four of them belong to the Democratic party with one non-partisan. All of Roosevelt's backers who voted in the two preceding elections voted for him, as did the undecided voters.

### The opinion in this part of the country is not as definitely

insufficient persons apply from some localities the quota must be waived. Thus, both Massachusetts and New York have exceeded their quotas. When openings occur, persons from Wisconsin will be given preference over those from either Massachusetts, New York, or other states which have gone over their allotments.

When the final census figures are announced for the United States, a reapportionment in civil service quotas will take place. Little change is anticipated in Wisconsin, however, as the increase in population is expected to be at about the same percentage as that for the entire country.

Many more civil service positions will be open "in the field," officials declare, but in places outside Washington the quota system is not operative.

## Two Engineering Classes Offered by Extension

Two classes in practical subjects for men in engineering vocations will be offered in Madison this fall in the University of Wisconsin extension division program. They are construction estimates and costs, under Prof. H. E. Fulver, and heating, ventilating, refrigeration and air conditioning, under Prof. C. L. Dean.

The course in estimating is intended for architects, engineers, building, carpenter, concrete, highway and other contractors, appraisers, construction superintendents and foremen, timekeepers, men in architects' and engineers' offices, in city and highway engineering offices, and for others. Sixteen weekly meetings are planned.

The course in heating and related subjects will consist of 17 weekly meetings each semester, and is open to men with training equivalent to high school graduation. Classes will be held in the mechanical engineering building, beginning when sufficient students have enrolled.

Registrations in both courses are being received by the extension field office, 313 Extension building.

## Excitement, Worry Cause Dreams, Warning

Dr. James H. Leavelle, of the State Medical society said in its weekly bulletin today:

"Dreaming is less likely to occur when a person goes to bed moderately tired than when he is excessively worried, excited, sleepily, or depressed," the society pointed out.

Some persons sleep better during the first part of the night because hunger contractions of the stomach in the later part wake them up and keep them awake, according to the society.

However, "most people sleep enough if they have the opportunity and favorable conditions. Insufficient sleep results in a reduction of muscular and mental efficiency," the society said.
