HEALTH AND PHYSICAL FITNESS PROGRAM WILL BE PUSHED AT Y. M. C. A.

The development of sound health and physical fitness will receive careful attention in the Y. M. C. A. during the coming months according to J. H. Eckford, general secretary. The entire physical department program has been re-studied and adjusted to more perfectly achieve these two goals. Furthermore, all activities in this department will be conducted as a part of an all-round program for the purpose of developing healthy bodies, physical skills, right thinking personalities and members of a Christian democracy.

In these days of many emergencies," says Eckford, "men and young men who are physically fit will be the ones best qualified to meet the important problems and exacting situations in the days ahead, while those whose health is below accepted standards will face handicaps. The healthy person has always had a decided advantage over the person of lowered vitality when it comes to meeting the demands of citizenship, whatever the task to which he may be called. This is doubly true in these days when life moves at such rapid speed."

The physical department program, under the leadership of Roy S. Armstrong, director, is divided into three general classifications—individual exercise, classes for instruction, and competitive athletics. In all these, primary emphasis will be placed on health, body development and improvement of skills. Notable advance has been made during the past year in the association's aquatic program by adopting in their entirety, the new national Y. M. C. A. standards. Comparable advance

is now being undertaken in the health education and gymnasium programs. A simple system of self-checking, coupled with clearly defined achievement goals will soon be available for men who wish to begin a systematic program of improvement. The plan is designed to center the attention of young and older men upon the problem of good health and create in them a desire for physical fitness, not only for its personal value but as a needed quality of citizenship.

A health and conditioning class for mature men will be conducted each Tuesday and Friday at 5 p. m. At 8:00 p. m. on Monday and Thursday there will be another class with a more general program of calisthenics, drills and volleyball. There will also be volleyball for men every week day at noon, with a period for more advanced players at 6 p. m. on Tuesday and Friday.

MANY CLASSES BEING FORMED

A weight lifting and body-building club for younger men is now being formed. This will be in addition to the young men's gym class which has a general program of exercises, drill and competitive games. Other specialized groups will include fencing, boxing, wrestling, archery, handball, badminton, swimming and diving.

FIVE FLEE FIRE WHICH DESTROYS FARM RESIDENCE

Flames which routed a family of five persons from their beds destroyed the farmhouse of J. J. Carroll, one mile north of Lafayette, early Monday morning, it was learned Tuesday.

The family, composed of Carroll, his wife, two sons and his wife's mother, Mrs. Jane Ransbottom, was awakened about 3 a. m., by flames and smoke and within two hours the house, with all its contents, was in ruins.

Mrs. Ransbottom, who has been bedfast for the past two years and suffered a severe heart attack a week ago, was carried from the house by Mrs. Carroll, while other members of the family fled in their night clothes, unable to rescue any other clothing.

Neighbors gathered and aided in keeping the flames from other farm structures. No fire department was summoned as the fire went beyond control within a few minutes.

Mrs. Carroll said cause of the fire was undetermined and she discounted rumors that the blaze was started when her mother lighted a coal oil lamp which exploded. She said her mother was bedfast and unable to get up to light the lamp.

Loss was set at approximately \$3,500.

CIVIL SERVICE SEEKS MEN FOR TWO POSITIONS

Announcement of open competitive examinations for the positions of electroplater, \$1,620 to \$1,930 a year, and electroplater's helper, \$1,260 to \$1,620 a year, less deduction of 3 1/2 per cent for retirement annuity, has been made by the U. S. Civil Service commission.

Applications must be filed before the close of business on Sept. 30 with the secretary of the board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners, Cincinnati. Application blanks may be received at the local postoffice.

Electroplater applicants must show that they have completed a four-year apprenticeship as an electroplater or that they have had at least four years of practical experience in the trade. Applicants for electroplater's helper must show that they have had at least six months of experience in the electroplating trade, or the completion of one scholastic year of a mechanical course in electroplating work in a vocational school, or of 18 month's duration in evening class attendance in a resident trade school.

Applicants must be in round physical health and must not have passed their 50th birthday. Full information regarding the examinations may be obtained from C. F. Walther at the postoffice.
