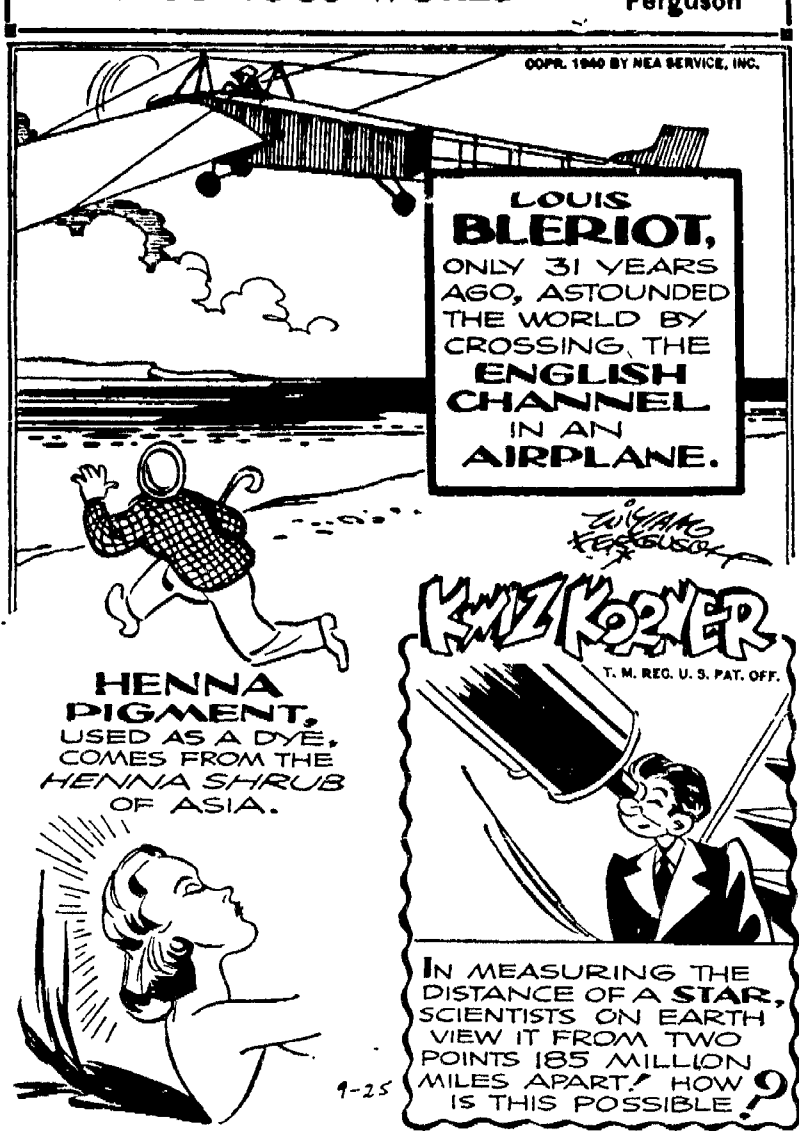

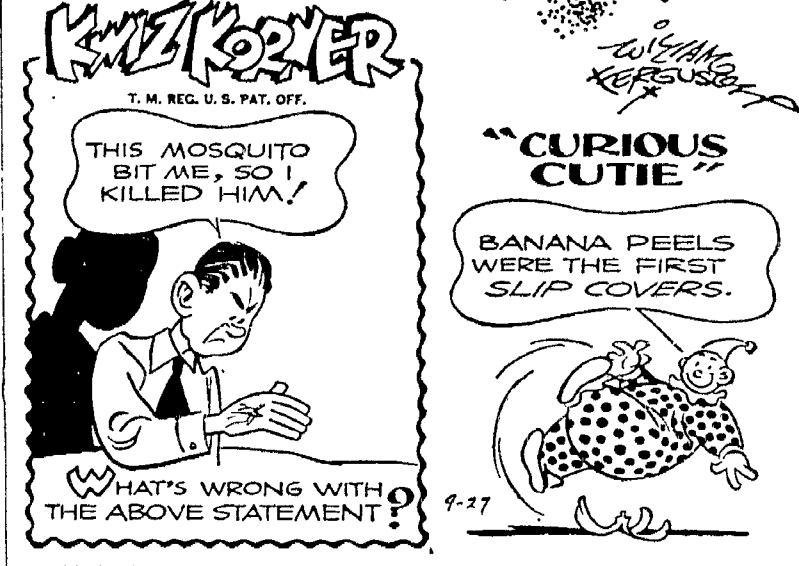
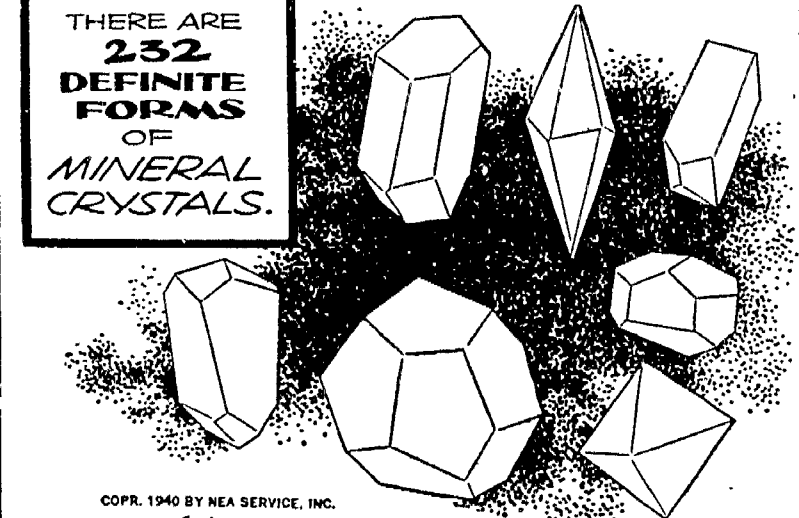

Lyric Offers Tale Of Frank James Commencing Thursday; State Presents Dance And Comedy Films In New Billing

"The Return of Frank James," starring Henry Fonda and commencing Thursday at the Lyric theatre, is the story of Frank's determination to avenge the cowardly murder of his brother, Jack. Also in the cast are Jackie Cooper, Gene Tierney, Henry Hull, John Carradine, J. Edward Bromberg, and Donald Meek.

At the State commencing Thursday is "Two Girls on Broadway," starring Joan Blondell, Lana Turner and George Murphy in a love story of a trio of dancers, and "You Can't Fool Your Wife." Showing for the last time Wednesday are "The Mortal Storm," with James Stewart, Margaret Sullivan, Robert Young and Frank Morgan, and "The Saint Takes Over," starring George Sanders.

Knickerbocker, Karl Von Wiegand, Robert Casey, the late Webb Miller, Louis Lochner, Dan DeLuca and scores of others, America would be forced to rely entirely upon what the European propaganda machines turn out for public consumption.

The Wanger dedication, which introduces the Hitchcock thriller drama, reads: "To those intrepid ones who went across the seas to be the eyes and ears of America—to those forthright ones who early saw the clouds of war while many of us at home were seeing rained hopes—to those clear-headed ones who now stand like recording angels among the dead and dying—to the Foreign Correspondents, this motion picture is dedicated."

In "Foreign Correspondent," Joel McCrea has the title role and is seen as a New York police reporter who is sent abroad by his editor, irate at the lack of real understanding news, to find out what is happening behind the scenes.
