HEARING HELD ON SIDNEY FIRM LABOR TROUBLE

SIDNEY, Oct. 3—The hearing in the matter of the American Steel Scraper Co. and the International Association of Machinists, Lodge No. 1608, American Federation of Labor, was brought to a conclusion after a two-day session. The hearing was open to the public and was conducted before Trial Examiner William Myers of the National Labor Relations board on allegations in a complaint filed against the company with the board.

The charge made in the complaint was that the company hired new employees in place of regular employees who were laid off or fired in order to discourage membership in the union, specifically Vernon Shelby, Joseph Reading, Paul Mays and Charles Allen, whom the complaint stated the company discharged Dec. 19, 1939, in order to discourage the union and membership in the union.

Seven witnesses were examined for the local union and four for the company. Representing NLRA was Max Johnston of Washington, D. C., the A. F. of L. by A. G. Skunder of New Castle, Pa., and the company by Urban H. Doorey of Sidney. The NLRA will review
