Pro Eleven **Beats Eagles**

NEW YORK—(U.?)—The revi-talized Brooklyn Dodgers made a highly successful hometown debut tonight by smashing through and passing over the flashy but erratic Philadelphia Eagles for a 30-17 triumph that moved them into second place in the eastern half of the National Professional Football League.

Again demonstrating their marked improvement under the tutelage of their new coach, "Jock" Sutherland, the Dodgers banged over 17 points for a substantial lead in the second period and then stubbornly held their advantage to the delight of 24,-008 partisan fans under the arc lights at Ebbets Field.

It took Brooklyn almost a period to get started and by that time the Eagles vaulted into a 3-0 advantage when Johnny Cole kicked a 45-yard field goal. But once the Dodgers found their stride they marched 67 and 55 yards to touchdowns which culminated in forward passes in the second quarter. Ralph Kercheval then matched the Philadelphia field goal with one of his own from the 38-yard line and gave Brooklyn a 17-3 advantage at the

Davcy O'Brien, bottled up thoroughly in the first two quarters, flung the Eagles into scoring territory with a 19-yard pass which Herschel Ramsey carried to the Dodger six yard line mid-way in the third. After four smashes at the line Elmer Hackney scored and Fran Murray converted to bring the score to 17-10 at the end of the third.

Brooklyn marched back with "Pug" Manders plunging over the line on the first play of the fourth period and drew away again at 23-10. The remainder of the period

was crammed with excitement. Philadelphia took the ball on the Dodger 48 and with O'Brien slinging passes like buckshot, moved to the 10. There the diminutive back attempted to pass, changed 268, 198 and 22. Tony Schwoegler his mind, and spun 10 yards and Joe Hackett topped the alley around end for the Eagles' final




