(Lima News Bureau) WAPAKONETA, Oct. 10 — Official yields of various types of hybrid corn harvested at the Manchester farm, near New Hampshire, are being computed and will be announced within the next several days. Clarence D. Brown, Auglaize-co agent, announced today.

The different types of corn were planted as an experiment under supervision of the county soil and corn committee. The crop was harvested Tuesday at the first annual Hybrid Corn day held on the farm. A new hybrid—Ohio 76—was the highest yielding, according to field weight, Brown said.

VOICE OF THE PEOPLE

Lima, O., Oct. 1940
Editor of The Lima News,
Lima, Ohio
Dear Sir—

Several days back there appeared in the News a number of reasons why we should enter the war. Nothing new was said; almost word for word it was all said long ago, before our entry into the World war—false slogans, catch words and phrases, half-truths, whole cloth fabrications—all the old shibboleths used again. One refuses to believe that democracy is so hard pressed that it needs to call such dubiously lean aiders to its assistance.

The first of the arguments set forth was that we must make war on those who have somewhere in the past discarded international law; if so we will have to engage the universe because there is no nation under the sun completely guiltless in that respect. At any rate one should think it would prove to be a rather unsatisfactory reason for dying.

Secondly we were told we must enter into immediate and mortal combat with those nations who do not respect our sovereignty. Sovereignty—that's a big word, quite a mouthful, but I doubt if it would hold much favor for the parent whose child had been compelled to die for it.

In the drumming up of these reasons the word honor was used—honor will compel us to avoid peace and seek war. Individuals in the old dueling days had the same mistaken notions of honor. Obsessed with that kind of idea any seemingly outward incident furnished the necessary insult and provocation, then they challenged, fought and killed each other—and their "honor" was satisfied.

Which must have been more comfort for the wives and children they left behind. Surely there must be a more Christian way, not to speak of a sensible one, to defend our honor. I know I should think my child's life tremendous coinage to pay for it. In Pierre Van Peasens' book "Days of Our Years" there is a story of General Poch, who, at the unveiling of a monument of war dead, spoke chidingly to a weeping old woman whose child's name appeared on this tribute to heroes. Madame, do not weep—this war restored Allies and Lorraine to the Republic, he said. The old mother replied "Monsieur, you may have Alsace-Lorraine but give me back my son."

Comedy Theme Predominates In Two New Quilna Movies

"The Great Profile" And "Young People" Set To Be Shown At Friday Evening Preview

Comedy prevails in the two new pictures, "The Great Profile," and "Young People," which starts at the Quilna Friday night preview. Hollywood favorites who have leading roles in these hits are John Barrymore, Mary Beth Hughes, Shirley Temple, Jack Oakie and Charlotte Greenwood. "The Howards of Virginia," the story of the fight of early Americans for their freedom, will show thru Friday afternoon.

A dashing English peer turns detective when a criminal interference with his honeymoon. Robert Montgomery enacts Lord Peter Wimsey, and Constance Cummings his bride, in "Haunted Honeymoon," a mystery-comedy now current at the Ohio theatre. Others in the cast are Leslie Banks, Sir Seymour Hicks and Robert Newton.

Two great pictures, "Brother Orchid," and "Saps at Sea," open Thursday at the State theatre for a three-day run. Edward G. Robinson, Ann Sothern and Humphrey Bogart are starred in the first hit which is a tale of what happens to a gangster who goes to a monastery. Stan Laurel and Oliver Hardy, Hollywood's greatest comedy team, are featured in the second production.

Lovely Anne Shirley is cast as a school teacher in "Anne of Windy Poplars," half of the Sigma bill. In this production Anne has romantic as well as vocational problems to solve. "Mystery Sea Raider," also at the Sigma with Carole Landis and Henry Wilcoxon, deals with an American merchantman seized by a belligerent power.

"Forgotten Girls," which opens Friday at the Lyric, deals dramatically with one of the most trying of our national problems—the underprivileged youth. It stars Louise Pratt, Jack LaRue and Wynne Gibson. "Three Faces West," a story of the dust bowl, also will open. Ending Thursday are "The Doctor Takes a Wife," with Lovette Young and Ray Milland, and "Earthbound."

Commencing Thursday at the Lyric theatre are "Everything on Ice," a rollicking comedy, and "Carson Rides Again," thrilling western hit.

Britain's recent recapture of 500 prisoners-of-war from the German navy auxiliary, Altmark, was seized by Hollywood movie makers and included in "Mystery Sea Raider," which is now at the Sigma theatre.

The script for the picture, whose principal players are Henry Wilcoxon, Carole Landis and Onslow Steven, already had included much of the sea saga of the City of Flint, American freighter whose capture by a German raider and subsequent release by Norwegian authorities created an international furor.

By confidence, the picture's intended ending almost paralleled the new Altmark affair, in which British destroyers entered neutral waters to board the vessel and release its Allied seamen who had been taken by the ill-fated Graf Spee. Only slight revisions in the script was necessary.

In the picture, the ship is an American tramp steamer of Shipping Board vintage, with American and Allied crewmen held prisoners aboard during an argosy based somewhat on the City of Flint incident.

A small-town school teacher who finds her career handicapped by the open hostility of a powerful, vindictive family controlling the community, is the role portrayed by Anne Shirley in "Anne of Windy Poplars," also at the Sigma.

Adapted from a popular novel, the film is laid on Prince Edward Island and presents Miss Shirley

in the title role. Other principal parts are played by James Ellison, Henry Travers, Patric Knowles, Slim Summerville, Elizabeth Patterson, Louise Campbell, Joan Carroll, Katharine Alexander, Minnie Dupree, Alma Kruger and Marcia Mae Jones.

The novel and laugh-studded situation of a young Englishman and his wife, the one a dashing member of the British aristocracy with a leaning towards crime detection; the other a writer of detective fiction, who journey to the country-ide for a quiet honeymoon only to discover a corpse in the cellar of their honeymoon cottage, is played to the hilt in the latest of M-G-M's British-made productions, "Haunted Honeymoon," now on the Ohio screen.

You cannot help but be vastly amused and entertained by the debonair hero, Lord Peter Wimsey who, as a man-hunter in top hat and tails, is fully as unusual a character as his name implies, and as portrayed by Robert Montgomery, emerges on the screen as one of those delightful people whom you may not readily identify as the "man next door" but who nevertheless remains a real and ingratiating person.

Such is the versatility of Mr. Montgomery's acting abilities that he can play a role like that of the neurotic gangster-nobelman of "The Earl of Chicago," his last film, and immediately switch without the batting of an eyelash to the debonair, suave and always affable Lord Peter of his present vehicle. Whether he be cross-examining a reluctant but suspicious witness, investigating the contents of an innocent flower pot, an action which in this instance has far-reaching consequences, or finding himself transformed into an approximation of a minstrel man when he becomes engulfed in a cloud of chimney soot, Montgomery seems never to make a false

step, every gesture, every intonation of voice fitting brilliantly into his characterization.

BRACKNEY HERD WINS HONORS IN SEPTEMBER TEST

(Lima News Bureau) WAPAKONETA, Oct. 10 — The purebred Holstein herd of Mrs. S. W. Brackney and son, Leland, virtually won all honors in the Auglaize-Shelby Dairy Herd Improvement-assign for September, Howard Stamp, official tester, announced today.

The Brackney herd was first in production and butterfat with a 1, 145.7 pound milk average, and 40.7 pound butterfat average. They also are the owner of the individual cow winner which produced 2,040 pounds of milk and 65.3 pounds of butterfat.

S. W. Lammers and Sons of near New Knoxville were second in herd production averaging 935.6 pounds of milk and 37.2 pounds of butterfat. Paul Moeller of New Bremen took third.

Paul Dickson of near Harrod took second and third in the individual cow competition with 59.8 and 56.9 pounds of butterfat respectively. Florenz Niemeyer of near New Knoxville was fourth.

FLAGS GIVEN BY AUXILIARY

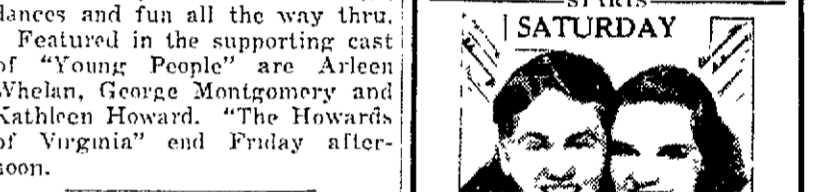
