Things happened fast after that. Young Horner came to the show, saw it and conquered it. At 16 he entered the bulldogging competition as sort of an ab lib gesture, threw the first steer he ever saw and won himself first prize of \$25 and a job as a full-blown rodeo hand at \$50 a week. He has been at it ever since and the work has giv horseback in Coatesville, Pa., seven years ago.

Today at 27 he is a veteran of the circuit and he and his wife tour the trails together. They begin in the spring at Kissimmee, Fla., and play such cities as San Angelo, Houston, Denver, Ft. Worth, Cleveland, Ogden, Bellfourche, Pendleton, Cheyenne, Calgary, Pittsburgh, Boston and finally come to what now is the biggest rodeo of all-the four-


