Brooklyn Grabs Easy 21-0 Win

NEW YORK (U.P.) - Coach "Joek" Sutherland gave his reserves a stiff workout Sunday as the Brooklyn Dodgers coasted to a 21-0 victory over the Pittsburgh Steelers in a National Football League game at Ebbets Field before a crowd of 19,463.

The Brooklyn varsity hammered over two touchdowns in the first period and then, except for a brief spell in the third when Pittsburgh threatened to score, the Dodger bench warmers did most of the work.

The victory kept the Dodgers safely in second place in the eastern division with three victories and one defeat against four victories for the pace-setting Washington Redskins.

The game was only five minutes old before the Dodgers jumped into the lead. Rhoten "The Ripper" Shetley intercepted Tommy Thompson's pass and looped 37 yards to the Steeler 18 yard line. In three plays the Dodgers, led by Ace Parker, crashed to the one yard line.

Five minutes later, the Dodgers started a drive from their own 37-yard stripe. Banks McFadden ripped off eight yards. Manders handed the ball on a reverse to Parker who tossed a long pass to Perry Schwartz. Perry ran 22 yards to the Pittsburgh 16. Parker made a yard, Manders made eight, and Parker then flipped a flat pass which Schwartz caught deep in the end zone. Parker kicked the point and the second team took over.

Starting the third period, the Steelers moved to the Brooklyn 42. Armand Zietlow's try for a field goal was short. The next time they got their hands on the ball, the Steelers drove from their own 24 to the Dodger eight-yard line but lost the ball on downs as Sutherland rushed in his first string line.

Late in the game, the Dodgers uncovered a crackerjack half-back, Bill Leckonby of St. Lawrence who was a reserve last year and never saw action. Bill played his first pro game Sunday and engineered the third Dodger touchdown drive in the final period. The Dodgers took the ball on downs on their own 36 and with Leckonby throwing a long pass to Herman Hodges and making a score, the Dodgers were on the ground again, the Dodgers went to the Steelers' eight-yard stripe. Ralph Kercheval then whipped

touchdown.
On the second play of the second quarter Fran Murray attempted a field goal for Philadelphia from the Giant 41 but was short. After several exchanges of punts, Ward Cuff tried a Giant field goal from the Eagle 30, but was wide.

The Giants, defending eastern division champions, within three minutes in the third period drove 74 yards through the Eagle line for a score. Cuff ran the kick-off to his 26 and then advanced to the 38 on a reverse. Big Walt Nielsen scampered another 19 yards to the Eagle 37 and in four plays the Giants were at the 25.

Eddie Miller started over guard, cut back and raced 25 yards to a touchdown standing up. Cuff converted and seven minutes later booted a successful field goal from the Eagle 35 after Nielsen had recovered Davey O'Brien's fumble on the New York 49.

The second Giant march was all Tuffy Leemans. The burly back pounded the Eagle forwards on his own 44 then passed to Lee Shaffer for 16 yards and again for eight and first down on the Eagle 11. Leemans again passed six yards to Shaffer for a touchdown. Feet Barnum added the point. The Philadelphia touchdown followed near the end of the game, after O'Brien had gone to the bench.

The Giants gained 189 yards rushing to 15 but only 87 against 102 passing. New York completed nine of 15 throws to the same number of completions in 21 attempts for the Eagles, and piled up 13 first downs to nine. The summary:

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A throng of 30,317 saw the Eagles hold the Giants scoreless throughout a bitter first half and then come apart at the guard and tackle positions in the last two periods. The Giants pushed over their first touchdown and clicked with the field goal in the third quarter then scored again in the fourth.

Their chances all but ruined by butter-fingered pass receivers, the Eagles were unable to penetrate beyond the enemy 30-yard line until the last three minutes. Then Foster Watkins faked back to the mid-field stripe, heaved a long aerial to Jay Arnold who carried to the six-inch line. One play later Frank Emmons plunged for the

Baugh Passes Redskin Eleven to 28-21 Win

WASHINGTON (U.P.) - The Washington Redskins rallied with a 14-point, second half splurge Sunday and defeated the Chicago Cardinals, 28-21, to remain the only undefeated team in the National Professional Football League.

It was the passing wizardry of Sammy Baugh that carried the Redskins to their fourth straight triumphs. "Slingin' Sam" pitched three touchdown passes—two of them enabling the Redskins to tie the score and the third putting them in front.

In one of the most amazing exhibitions seen here, Baugh repeatedly brought the crowd of 33,891 to its feet by completing 12 of 17 passes good for 215 yards. Frankie Filchuck, who shares the passing assignment with Baugh, completed six out of 12 tosses for 107 yards.

Passes accounted for all the Washington touchdowns and all but 115 of the team's 441 yards in a game that saw the score tied three times before the Redskins went ahead to stay.

The rejuvenated Cardinals completed only five of 14 passes, with Beryl Clark making the important pitches. His passes were rewarded by touchdowns. Chicago gained a total of 208 yards and was out-downed, 20-5.

Midway in the opening period Clark rifled a 10-yard pass to Lloyd Madson who took the ball over his shoulder and raced to score. Clark converted. Baugh heaved a 12-yard pass to Half-back Dick Todd who took the ball on his own 31 and outdistanced the entire Chicago club. End Bob Masterson converted. Baugh struck again a few minutes later. A Baugh to Masterson pass was good for 37 yards and Sam rifled another pass to Wilbur Moore, who was waiting in the end zone. Masterson again converted.

Chicago Coach Jimmy Conzelman promptly sent in a new team and the strategy was rewarded by a touch down. Marshall Goldberg ripped off a 23-yard gain, then Hugh McCullough pitched one to Gaynell Tinsley who was stopped on the one-foot line. McCullough knifed over and Lou Zontini's placement

over a sizzling flat pass which Leckonby caught in the end zone. Kercheval converted.
The Dodgers made eight first downs to Pittsburgh's 12; 137 yards rushing to Pittsburgh's 119 and completed six out of 16 forward passes for 121 yards gained passing and a net total yardage of 240. The Steelers completed nine out of 24 passes for 76 yards and a net total of 213. Billy Patterson of Pittsburgh was the leading ground gainer, making 57 yards in 17 attempts. The summary:

WASHINGTON (U.P.) - The Chicago Bears smashed through the Detroit Lions for a touchdown in the first 86 seconds of play Sunday to win their first home game of the season, 7-0. Detroit football fans at Wrigley Field.

The Bears scored in four plays. Steve Marone of the Lions kicked off to Ray Nolting, 185-pound left halfback, who returned the ball 54 yards to the Lions' 43 yard line. The Bears received a 15-yard holding penalty on a line play, but Saul Sherman, Bear quarterback, got it back with a little more when he went around end to the Lion's 34.

Then Bill Osmanski, former All-America at Holy Cross, went inside tackle for the touchdown. "Automatic" Jack Manders converted.
The remainder of the game was an exhibition of line plunging and passing by Byron "Whizzer" White and Lloyd Cardwell for the Lions and Ray Nolting and Gary Famiglietti for the Bears.

White, the All-America and Rhodes Scholar from Colorado, was the spotlight of the Lions. He played 55 minutes of the game.
The Lions missed a touchdown late in the first period when a 40-yard pass from White was fumbled by Cardwell on the goal line. The Lions had another scoring chance in the second but a fumble nullified it. White's deep punt to Swisher put the ball on the Bears 32.

A pass from Sid Luckman was intercepted by Bill Callahan and the Lions took the ball at mid-field. White passed to Hanneman, then to Cardwell, and line plunges carried the Detroiters to
