

# Drama Of Weird War Ruse On "Strange As It Seems"

### Jackson Wheeler, Emcee, Offers Story Of Trick Which Turned Back German Army; Benay Venuta Guest Of Musical Americana

A clever military ruse, which turned back the German army in 1918, but resulted in disgrace for the perpetrator, will be related by Jackson Wheeler, master of ceremonies, in a dramatization of Roger Bradman's war exploits on the Strange As It Seems program, Thursday at 8:30 p. m. over WABC.

Bradman's ruse was staged at a time when Germany had nearly succeeded in turning the left flank of the Allies to gain a clear path to Paris.

Harassed Belgian troops holding this flank had lightheaded small flares along the coast to attract British warships. Bradman, commanding a destroyer, was attracted by the flares, landed with a small party and concocted a trick that broke the invaders' spirits and ironically landed him in a prison camp in his own country.

# Quilna Previews Football Film And Musical Comedy

### "Yesterday's Heroes" And "Sing, Dance, Plenty Hot" Offered Friday Night; "Knut Rockne" To Open Saturday At Ohio
